#### GOLD PRODUCTION OF PORCUPINE CAMP

Over Half Million Dollars for August--Hollinger Set The Pace

In the month of August the gold production of the Porcupine camp was well over the half million mark and this with only three mills working to anything like full capacity. The Hollinger mine alone produced \$200,000 of which \$110,000 was saved in the last thirteen days. These figures are to be relied upon.

It is also reported that the Dome produced \$43,000 in the first week of September, which would run their total production for the present month to \$172,000. The McIntyre is producing about \$18,000, but the Vipond is not yet out of its mill difficulties and the production varies from day to day.

#### THE TIMMINS CROWD TOOK SOME REVENGE

The Game Last Sunday Was Done All the Way Until the Sixth

On Sunday last the Timmins team took revenge for their defeat here on Labor Day by doubling the score on the team from the Dome. In the early part of the game and even up to the sixth innings it looked like an easy win for the visitors. The score was then 4-1. Timmins however came across with a belated rally and won out. Hatch opened the game for the Dome with a slashing double and stealing third scored on an infield out. Timmins couldn't reach further than first base in their half. Timmins came across with a run when Nolan tallied their solitary run for six innings. This had received a trial on third base as Guilfoyle who has been the Timmins third-sacker all season is leaving for Toronto. In the sixth innings however the Timmins boys got busy with the bat and led

#### ACTIVE OPERATIONS HAVE BEEN RESUMED

The Three Nations Lake Mining Co. Has Installed New Machinery

The Three Nations Lake Mining Company has installed a four drill Rand compressor and resumed active operations at this mine. The present equipment was put in by G. R. Southey, branch manager of the Canadian Ingersoll Rand Company. The work is in charge of J. N. Angripon who is doing all possible to make this well-known property a producer in the very near future and the amount of work that has been done is showing good results.

The company has a large quantity of milling ore on the dump, and the mine is remembered as the one upon which the remarkable rich finds were made last May and which have continued with depth. The shaft is already down 118 feet and from this level something over two hundred feet of cross-cutting has been accomplished and over a hundred feet of

drifting. The shaft is to be sunk another hundred feet and a ten stamp mill to be erected this year.

Great interest is being taken by the mining men of the camp in the development of this property and several offers of amalgamation with well-known Porcupine properties have been made.

The directors and party of share holders will pay a visit to the camp during the latter part of the month and will find their interests have been most capably looked after by Manger Andripon. The camp buildings have been well constructed and are commodious and comfortable. A shipping mine in Northern Whitney will do all that is wanted to stimulate capital in the development of the other properties of merit in this section of the camp.

#### NEW RICH VEIN ON THE PLENAURUM

Shaft on Opposite Side of Pearl Lake Will Soon Be Connected

Some new rich surface veins have been uncovered at the Plenaureum and this property is also looking better in the underground workings each day. Only 20 feet of cross-cutting remains to be done now to connect up the two shafts on the opposite sides of the lake at the 200-foot level. As soon as this connection is completed the blocking out of the ore bodies at this property will go on much more rapidly.

George A. Greener, who a couple of weeks ago received injuries at the Hollinger mine when his shoulder was dislocated and otherwise badly bruised up--has sufficiently recovered so as to attend to his duties and resume his position at the mine.

#### ANOTHER NEW SILVER STAMPEDE

Auld Township, Heretofore Neglected By Prospectors, Now a Busy Place

Homer L. Gibson and Al. Boyd have left for Auld township on the Montreal River where recent rich silver finds are said to have made. The township of Auld is within a dozen miles of Cobalt and since the Elk Lake silver camp first came into existence has been traversed many times with comparative little prospect work done in comparison to the surrounding townships, and until about two weeks ago, nothing looking like silver was ever found. According to the Cobalt Nugget, a Renfrew man by the name of Hitchcock made the first discoveries that have started the rush of the past two weeks. He purchased a veteran claim and when he went to look it over the first thing that struck his eye was a fissure of decomposed vein matter which showed native silver. He investigated further and has been doing some surface work, with the result that three or four veins, between two and six inches in high-grade quantities have been encountered by him.

The general formation of the country would indicate a farming community although there are heavy ridges of diabase and quartzite although this latter is claimed to be a fine grained conglomerate. The ridge upon which the discovery was made runs northeast and southwest, across the sixth concession of the township, while the veins, all of which seem to be true fissure veins, run east and west through the ridge. W. F. Trethewey of Toronto was an early staker in that section having staked several claims this week while Fred Jordon and James Kilroy, two Haileybury prospectors, have returned with nice looking samples of silver ore from the new finds.

The township of Auld is cut in two by the Montreal river and the finds are in lot 2, in the 6th concession, on the east side of the river. They lie about two miles from Indian Lake, on the Montreal River, about five hours journey by boat from Latchford. The township is cut up by many veteran claims, making it difficult

#### PORCUPINE PATRICIA STARTED DEVELOPMENTS

Named After Princess Patricia, Daughter of the Duke of Connaught

The Porcupine Patricia, in Northern Whitney, is the latest addition to the working companies in this camp.

This company owns a claim adjoining the Hughes, the Daly-Taylor syndicate property formerly, and has a gang of men employed in surface work. A vein has been uncovered on this claim, which runs six feet wide and has some good showings. From its strike, this is evidently a prolongation of the Hughes vein, as it is right in line with the vein that the Montreal Company has located now on the surface and on three levels underground. Trenching in this section of the camp is expensive owing to the heavy overburden, and the vein has only been uncovered for a distance of about 25 feet.

work for the prospector who goes into the bush without a map showing these veteran lots. On one veteran claim, owned by a man in Kingston, an old veteran, five distinct views all showing native silver, have been discovered, but cannot be touched on account of the claim against it. Prospectors from Elk Lake are blocking into that section and it is likely that in addition to staking the entire ridge upon which the discoveries have been made, other townships in the immediate vicinity will be traversed by the prospectors and other finds may be made.

A government road from Haileybury to the Montreal river runs just a few miles south of the finds, through a farming section while the Elk Lake branch of the T. & N. O. Railway, now under construction runs through the township of Cain, immediately north of Auld and five miles north of the discoveries. Active work is looked for by the owners of the claims during the balance of the present summer. The recording office for filing the claims in the township is at Elk Lake.

#### MINES LOOKING GOOD AROUND PEARL LAKE

The Jupiter Working in Good Ore and New Finds Being Made

Mines around Pearl Lake have never looked more promising than at the present time and within the next twelve months there should be at least three shipping mines in this immediate territory. At the Jupiter prospecting operations from their lower shaft have resulted in the location of a nice vein carrying free gold. This vein is running two feet wide at the point where

it was located by the crossect, and from its direction is evidently a stringer from a main vein, which should soon be picked up by the crossect. The work that is being done at this mine is from the one shaft only, at the 300 foot level. This crossect will be continued to the upper shaft of the Jupiter and a raise put through to the 100 foot to connect the two shafts.

#### HIGH-GRADE ORE AT THE McENANEY MINE

The Car of Dump Ore Sent to McGill Gives \$20.00 Values

The most important development on the Crown Reserve's Porcupine property, the McEnaney, is the opening up of the ore shoot on the 200-foot level. This shoot has now been proved for a distance of 403 feet carrying values better than the average on this property and at the McEnaney the average values are \$20. This is the figure that was obtained for the car-load of ore that was sent to McGill school of mines for a test mill run. The ore submitted to this test was not picked, it was just the run of the dump. The dump contains 3,000 tons of ore at a value of \$20 per ton and will provide a nice start for the five-stamp mill with which the McEnaney is to start operations. Preparations for this mill are being rushed and the excavations for the foundation are nearly completed.

Concrete foundations will be built for a ten-stamp mill but only five stamps will be installed now, the rest being put in afterwards. The mill will have a capacity of 40 tons daily and the dump together with the ore obtained in the progress of the development work at the mine will provide a large store of ore for a mill of this size without the necessity of commencing any stopping for a considerable time.

The raise that is being put through on the vein from the 100-foot level is up now for a distance of 56 feet the values holding well. This raise being put through underneath the dump and will be used for a shoot through which the ore will be fed to the cars on the first level to be conveyed
