

Timmins News in Brief

Mr. and Mrs. P. Petchersky returned on Monday afternoon after a four week's vacation in Chicago and New York.

Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Faithful are again home after their recent two weeks vacation, arriving on the afternoon train last Monday.

The Empire Theatre was again crowded to the doors last Monday evening and also Tuesday when the special attraction was John Barrymore in "The Man from Mexico."

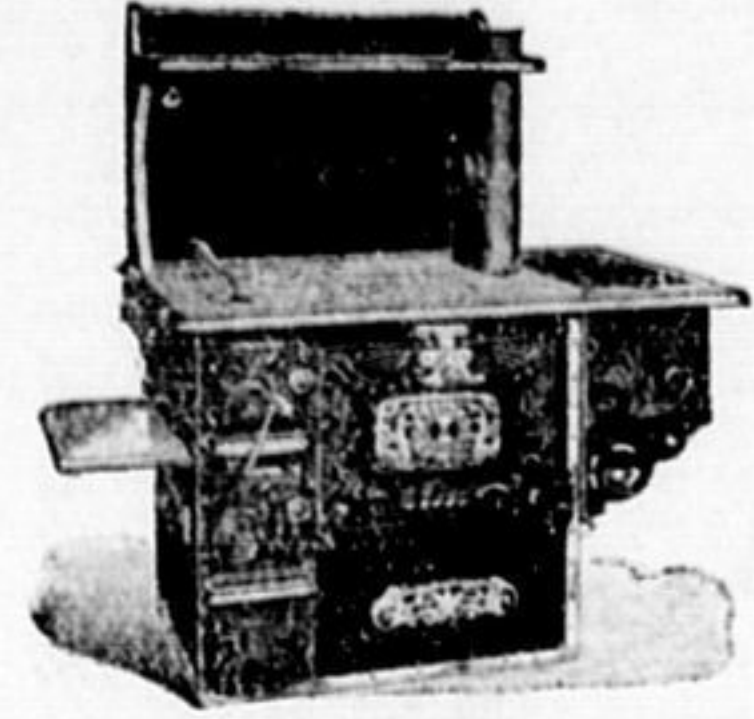

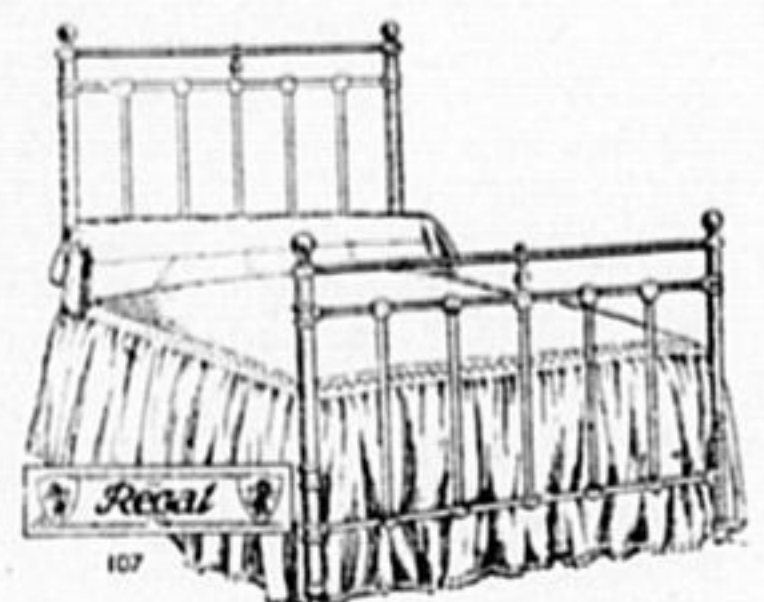
