

Timmins News in Brief

Mr. Stadelman, well known in the Cobalt camp, was a visitor to the gold district on business last week end.

Mr. K. F. DeLong, Manager of the Imperial Bank at Timmins, accompanied by his mother left last week for a vacation in different eastern cities of Ontario and Mr. DeLong will likely also visit the States before returning to the gold camp.

Mr. C. E. Patterson, who has been manager of the Timmins Coliseum for several months has left the gold camp for Colorado where he has accepted a position.

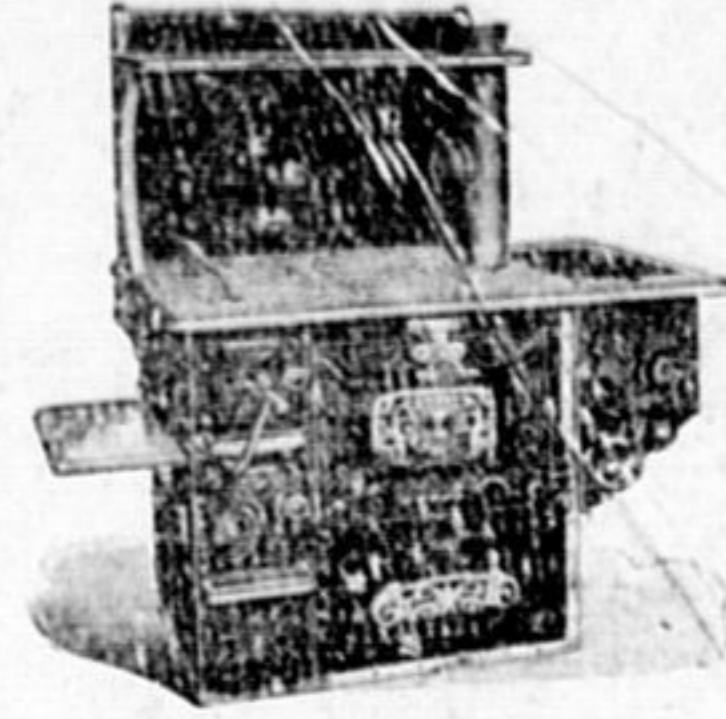
