FIVE KILLED AND MANY INJURED

Powder Works at Haileybury Destroyed by Explosion Wednesday Noon

Shortly after eleven-thirty Wednesday morning the factory of the Energite Explosives Company at Haileybury went up with a roar that could be heard for miles around. Five men lost their lives in the ex-Miss McDougall of Ottawa is visit- plosion and several others are sering Mr. and Mrs. Hawley Clay- jously injured, including the wife of one of the dead workmen. From the facts that can be ascertained at present, a fire started in the mixing room at the factory, and the girls who were working there were ordered to leave, thus saving what would have been a large loss of

The male employes of the building stayed to help extinguish the flames, when without warning the explosion Miss Margaret Deacon is home came. The explosion was the first thered at the scene, many willing volunteers assisting the doctors of the town in rendering first aid to the injured. The most seriously injured was Mrs. Chris Ackerson. whose husband lost his life in the explosion, and she is now at the hospital of the Sisters of Providence. It is not known whether she will recover from the effects of her

Although the factory was situated at a considerable distance from the town, an enormous amount of damage was done by the concussion. Practically every large window in the town was destroyed and some of the houses nearest the scene of the accident were considerably damaged. The dead are as follows


