Capt. Allan from Toronto arrived in camp on Wednesday evening and will take charge of the various official matters until the departure of the boys.

In addition also to the names given this week it is pleasing to note that several Russians were most desirous of rendering their services and accordingly a wire was sent to the Rus-

sian Consul in Montreal who replied that only reservists and territorials could be accepted. This means that Russians who have not served their own country according to their national requirements cannot enlist in Canada.

WHY NOT?

London, Oct. 13.—The following story is vouched for on authority that cannot be doubted:

General Ian Hamilton, in command of the Allied forces fighting the Turks had been telegraphing repeatedly to Lord Kitchener for additional troops to be sent to the Dardanelles.

"You'll be crying next for the moon," Kitchener wired back.

"Why not," replied General Hamilton, "if you want the Crescent?"

The success which has attended the Beaver and Temiskaming mines at Cobalt, especially the proof that in this section of the camp ore not only goes to depth but improves in value at the lower levels, has encouraged the re-opening of two properties which have been shut down for several years. The Rochester has been taken over by the Tretlowey Company, and now a new company has been formed to commence work on the Shamrock.

Local Patriotic Relief League Report

During the entire existence of the Patriotic Relief League of Selkma-cher and Timmins, \$1,472.78 was received and expended as follows:

Relief work for the victims of the war in Belgium, \$401.70.

Canadian Red Cross Society \$100.

To each of twenty local men with the second contingent:

3 pairs of socks, 1 pair of wristlets, 1 pair of Jaeger gloves, 1 Jaeger cholera band, 1 Balalaeva cap.

To each of nineteen men with Borden's Armored Battery:

3 pairs of socks, 6 handkerchiefs, 2,340 hospital handkerchiefs, 378 4-inch bandages, 45 night shirts, 10 pairs of socks, 10 pairs of wristlets, 2 pairs of Jaeger gloves 10 pairs of bed socks, 45 sheets, 87 pillow slips, 12 Turkish wash cloths, 88 knit wash cloths, 10 packs of cards, 72 packets of cigarettes, 26 pencils, 72 safety pins, 1 game of checkers, 10 pads of paper, 3 handkerchiefs, 1 package of oil silk, 2 combs, 2 tooth brushes, 1 hair brush, 49 towels, 2000 mouth wipes, 6 shaving brushes, 6 dressing gowns, 1 roll of absorbent bandages, 7 bed jackets, 10 40-in. square slings, 24 swabs, 250 old linen wash cloths, 1 cake of soap, 2 pairs of pyjamas; 19 kit bags each containing comb, brush, toothbrush and paste, two towels, wash cloths, soap, shirt, pyjamas, socks, soft slippers, 12 sheets of paper and envelopes, pencil, razor, shaving soap and brush, handkerchief and toilet paper.

Also several needy families in the district were helped with clothing and provisions.

Two men were maintained during recovery from illness.

All supplies on hand and a cash balance of \$83.88 were turned over to the Selkma-cher-Timmins Branch of the Canadian Red Cross Society, upon the dissolution of the Patriotic Relief League, Sept. 7th, 1915.

CASE OF T. M. WILSON, J.P., BY S. ALFRED JONES WAS DISMISSED BY MAGISTRATE

A point of law which may interest quite a large number of local leaseholders was that when Magistrate Atkinson gave his decision last night after a week's consideration in a case brought by S. Alfred Jones, K.C., of Cochrane, against T. M. Wilson, J.P., of Timmins.

Mr. Wilson had a three year lease on a building from Mr. Jones and moved the building. Mr. Jones claimed he had no right to do so although admitting no damage was done to the building. Mr. Wilson contended that under his lease he had the right and the Magistrate dismissed the case deciding that Mr. Wilson had "color of right" under the lease granted.
