tenance of a General Hospital for the Porcupine camp.

Transient Traders.

Another grievance brought up by the Board which should be attended to by the Town Council was that in regard to transient traders. It was mentioned that people from outside had come into town, opened up rented buildings and after a business career of perhaps a few months close down and leave without paying the necessary license as a transient trader. On the motion of J. P. McLaughlin, seconded by C. Pierce, it was therefore decided that the Secretary write the Town Council requesting them to enforce the present transient trader's license.

Better Phone Rates.

One other question, which has been brought forward by other bodies in the camp was that of lighting and telephone rates, and on the motion of C. Pierce, seconded by Geo. Preston, it was decided that a committee comprised of Dr. McInnes and J. P. McLaughlin be appointed to act with a committee of the Retail Merchants' Association to interview the Northern Ontario Light and Power Company with regard to better rates on telephones and lighting.

Following suggestions made at a previous Board meeting that a dinner be held by the Board, Messrs. King and Simms were requested to interview the Goldfields Hotel on this matter and report later so that arrangements might be made for the fixing of a date.

Count of Monte Cristo Coming to Empire
