RED CROSS CHRISTMAS BOX.

The Timmins Branch of the Canadian Red Cross Society has decided to undertake the collection and forwarding of the Christmas parcels for the boys at the front. The idea is to have all those who wish to remember some friend at the front, wrap their gift or gifts up, with the giver's card enclosed, and address of the friend on the outside. These packages are to be placed in the Red Cross Christmas baskets, of which there will be twenty-four, distributed throughout the town. The baskets will be collected at intervals, emptied at the Red Cross rooms, and returned to their places for further filling.

On Nov. 1st, the various packages addressed to any one man will be packed all in one box or large package and addressed to him. All these large boxes or packages will be delivered to the man by the Red Cross Society at the front.

In this way a man will receive one big box or package from the Timmins Red Cross Society. On opening it he will find a number of small gifts from his various friends, each gift bearing his friend's card. This will make it a real Christmas box.

The scheme was tried last year by the Hollinger Mines in regard to those who had enlisted and the success of the plan was unquestioned.

In order to facilitate packing and to make sure of delivery before Christmas, the gifts must be made ready immediately and baskets will be found at Post Office, Goldfields Hotel, Imperial Bank, Bank of Commerce, See's Drug Store, Burke's Drug Store, McLaughlin's General Store, Shipman's Candy Store, Marshall-Ecclestone's, Cumming's Cigar Store, Buevetsky's Store, Northern Canada Supply Co., Mettagami Hotel, Hollinger, Poreupine Crown, and North Thompson, provided that arrangements can be made at those places to take care of them.

If there is any doubt as to the way in which these packages are to be handled, any of the members of the Timmins branch of the Red Cross Society can give further information.

Remember, first, the gift must have the giver's name on card attached to it; second, the gift with attached card must be carefully wrapped and tied; third, the name and address of the one for whom the gift is intended must be plainly written on the outside, and fourth, all packages must be in the baskets before November 1, 1916.

If there is anyone who has no particular friend at the front whom they wish to remember, they may put anything they please, unaddressed, into the baskets and such gifts will be made up into parcels for those who left Timmins, to whom no gifts have been made.

Market letter of A. S. Fuller & Co.

The general financial situation is good and with the exception of the shortage of labor mining conditions both in Cobalt and Poreupine are at the best.

We believe we are on the eve of a very big market, especially in the Poreupine stocks and from information in our possession we are of the opinion that inside of the next 30 days the Poreupine stocks will undergo one of the biggest booms that as occurred since 1911. The elections in the States will be over about the first of November and we believe conditions there point to a large amount of attention being given to the Poreupine gold camp, in this and other financial centres.

Nearly every stock on the Poreupine list is a purchase at the present time with a few exceptions. We believe that Vipond should be bought at once as negotiations are now pending with the long-talked-of consolidation with the North Thompson. We are also advising the purchase of Poreupine Crown, Dome Ex., as especially good buys at the present time.

The situation in Cobalt is not quite so good as in Poreupine as there are possibilities of labor trouble. The price of silver is also an uncertain feature which cannot be counted on with any uncertainty. Under the circumstances we favor the Poreupines both for investment and speculation.

TRIAL OF IVA HUTCHISON

Crown Failed to Prove Charge of Manslaughter.

It will be remembered that on the 19th of August last, the body of a newly-born babe was found on the tracks of the T. & N. O. railway by some passing children, wrapped in rags and a Mail & Empire newspaper. The police authorities on suspicion arrested Iva Hutchison, who they thought to be the guilty party.

The trial of Iva Hutchison was heard last Thursday, Sept. 28th, at South Poreupine, at which the Crown failed to produce sufficient evidence to prove the girl guilty of manslaughter.

She was then charged with criminal concealment of birth, to which she pleaded guilty and received an indefinite sentence of not less than three months nor more than two years in the Mercer Reformatory at Toronto. The expiration of the sentence depends upon her good behavior.

Inspector Rogers, of the Provincial Police, has charge of her, and is to supervise her future behavior.

Market Letter Homer L. Gibson & Co.

Although the turn-over of shares on the Standard Stock Exchange has been fairly heavy during the fortnight price changes have been very few indeed. Evidences of a gradual but steady accumulation of the better class of shares by those best posted are seen, however, and it would appear probable that the public would shortly follow this lead.

The heavy over-subscription of the latest Canadian War Loan, indicates a plethora of funds in the Dominion, and as there is no doubt that the same conditions exists with our Southern neighbors, it seems reasonable to expect public participation from both sides of the line in our mining markets. Such participation is invariably accompanied by higher prices, so that to those with courage enough to make commitments in our present practically stationary market, early and substantial profits would appear to be available.

Tenders for Pulpwood and Pine Limit

Tenders will be received by the undersigned up to and including the 1st day of December next, for the right to cut pulpwood and pine timber on a certain area situated on the Pie River and other territory adjacent thereto, in the District of Thunder Bay.

Tenderers shall state the amount per cord on pulpwood, and per thousand feet, board measure, or pine, that they are prepared to pay as a bonus in addition to dues of 40 cents per cord for spruce, and 20 cents per cord for other pulpwoods, and \$2.00 per thousand feet, board measure for pine, or such other rates as may from time to time be fixed by the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council, for the right to operate a pulp mill and a paper mill on or near the area referred to.

Such tenderers shall be required to erect a mill or mills on or near the territory and to manufacture the wood into pulp and paper in the Province of Ontario—the paper mill to be erected when directed by the Minister of Lands, Forests and Mines.

Parties making tender will be required to deposit with their tender a

marked cheque, payable to the Honorable the Treasurer of the Province of Ontario, for twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000), which amount will be forfeited in the event of their not entering into agreement to carry out conditions, etc. The said \$25,000 will be applied on account of bonus dues, as mentioned above, will require to be paid in the usual manner as returns of cutting of wood and timber are received.

The highest of any tender not necessarily accepted.
