The scene of the wreck is about 200 yards west of the C.P.R. station on the Windsor main line. fiver was gradually drawing out the station when it met the "trooper" advancing around a dangerous curve at a 20-mile gait.

The engineers of both trains immediately saw the danger ahead and fammed on their emergency brakes, but they were of no avail.

Passenger Car Telescoped. The heavy troop train smashed into the pilot of the passenger train, the baggage car telescoping the first passenger coach, which was occupied by A Company of the 48th Highlanders, seriously injuring four and practically injuring the whole company.
