Mr. Merry Christmas is spending a few days in Cobalt this week.

Messrs. Dalton Bros. now have their new livery stable completed, equipped with phone, and are now in a position to look after the livery business of the town.

Mr. Garney Cunningham T. & N. O. Agent has left on a two weeks' vacation to Toronto, Buffalo, New York and Boston his place as agent is being filled by A. W. Brown, brother of the genial freight agent, G. K. "Buster" Brown.

Mr. J. P. McLaughlin has purchased the furniture business of McNabb and Co., and is now in a position to supply the needs of the home, in the line of high class furniture, of all kinds.

Mr. Barney McEnaney of Toronto, the staker of the McEnaney Mine, which is operated by the Crown Reserve people, came to camp Tuesday. The success with which the Development work is being carried on and the wonderful results that are being obtained at the mine is very gratifying to Mr. McEnaney.

Mr. E. N. Lightner, of Detroit, Mich. is in camp and as Mr. Lightner has been a constant visitor to the North Country for the last 5 years, he is very much impressed with the enormous advancement of the Porcupine camp when one considers that the camp really dates from the Big fire of last July.

O'Hearn, on account of his knowledge of the goods and wide acquaintance in the camp has for the present been engaged to look after the sale here and conduct it strictly as advertised.

Grain Movement Much Heavier

Ottawa, Nov. 1.—(Special)—Figures issued by the department of trade and commerce today show that for the week ending Oct. 25, 12,746,758 bushels of wheat are in store at terminal and eastern elevators, as compared with 3,265,380 last year. These figures indicate that the eastward movement of wheat is 50 per cent. heavier than it was at the same period last year.

Other grains to the amount of 3,424,110 bushels were in store on Oct. 25, as against 3,609,482 bushels on the same date last year.

Mr. F. S. Hurd, Dr. R. B. Castree and H. W. Barley of New York, have returned to New York after spending several days in Turnbull looking over properties, some of which they are about to purchase, as they contend that Turnbull looks as good as any part of the Porcupine camp at the same stage of development. What is needed most for this part of the Country is a road so as to enable property owners to take in heavy machinery, as these gentlemen said they were ready to put in machinery on Turnbull property as soon as there were facilities provided for the taking in of machinery.

The town of Timmins is taking on the appearance of a city more and more every day. The town is busy connecting up the Main Spring water pipes to the residences and places of business so as every building in town that so desires will have the privilege of being supplied with magnificent spring water, and the 40,000 gallon water tank of the T. & N. O. is also supplied with the same spring water. It is the intention of the Mayor and aldermen of the town to put in a large cement reservoir next summer with capacity large enough to supply a town of ten thousand population.

The six or eight new houses that are being built up in the residential section of the town overlooking Gillies Lake are nearing completion, there has been a scarcity of residences in town all summer and it is the intention to build about 30 more in the spring. The Northern Canada Supply Co. are going right ahead with the building of their large warehouse, it is located on the corner of Second Avenue and Spruce Street, and running through to Broadway on the south. The Company are also having a spur run into the warehouse from the T. & N. O., this will enable them to have their large shipments of heavy hardware delivered direct at the door with out handling which will in turn enable them to supply the camp with all kinds of mining supplies at almost the same price which they can be bought in Cobalt for, which will mean a great saving to those who are constantly requiring supplies of this nature.

GREAT FINANCIERS AGAINST WAR

Peace Will Be Maintained For Commercial Reasons and Not Humanitarian

Discussing the monetary aspect of the Balkan trouble, Henry Clewes, the New York banker, says:

Financial influences are inevitably coming to be the controlling factor in this war. In these days war is chiefly a matter of finance, and the allies opposing Turkey cannot continue indefinitely a loss of a million dollars per day, the present estimated cost of the war.

The Balkan States, it should be carefully noted, have limited credit. They cannot borrow extensively in the European markets for war purposes and their home resources will be quickly exhausted. Two weeks than \$15,000,000, and this has already been seriously depleted by the mobilization of 200,000 men.

Much Better Credit.

Turkey on the other hand, has much better credit than all the Balkan States combined. In case of necessity she might be able to float a foreign loan. But there are even more important considerations than these affecting the war.

The interests of Austria, Germany and Russia are all on the side of peace. These countries are each actively engaged in unusual industrial and commercial developments, and their great banks are fully occupied in financing such operations.

Their funds also, which through London controls the money bags of the world, is unqualifiedly opposed to any serious international disturbance. Her great bankers could not be induced to lend money to any great power for war purposes.

Will be Strictly Localized.

Humanitarian considerations would have little influence compared with the great commercial considerations which centre in London, and are more emphatically ranged against armed conflicts than at any time in the world's history.

In short, there is little prospect of a European war.

Peace will be maintained largely for commercial reasons; and whatever the final outcome of the struggle between the Balkan States and Turkey there is no longer any question but that the contest will be strictly localized.

Not improbably an adjustment will be reached between Turkey and her enemies in the form of a compromise that will work out toward an even more lasting peace in that part of the world.

Bringing Money Into Canada

In seven years 674,305 people left the western states to seek homes in the Canadian Northwest. The total value of their effects and cash is given as \$775,359,405, representing wealth per capita of \$1,150.

Emigration to Canada, as The Wall Street Journal points out, is not a harvest festival. They come to stay and to better their conditions. That the immigrants, as a rule, are a desirable lot, more so indeed than nine-tenths of those who are assisted from the old land, is shown by the return of actual cash and property in their possession when they come to us.

Passenger Trains Into Elk Lake

Speaking in regard to the completion of the T. & N. O. line between Elk Lake City and Earleton, Chairman J. L. Englehart says that it would form a Christmas present or a New Year's greeting to the country. Less than half the line is to be completed. The bridge across the Montreal River will be rushed from this date, all the necessary material having been secured.

Ruling on Stock Purchases

The Appellate Term of the United States Supreme Court has refused to permit Charles A. Stoneham & Co., to appeal from a ruling that when brokers agree to buy stock on margin for a customer they must have the stock on hand to deliver to the customer as soon as he is ready to take it up and make full payment.
