After the matter had been thoroughly discussed the Chairman asked if any of those present had any resolution to put to the meeting.

Mr. H. H. Davies stated that the Council, as a Council, could have nothing to do with the fund, except that they were elected as trustees of same. If they wanted the money to be kept here, the subscribers must elect a committee and hand the money over to the gentlemen appointed as trusees only. They would then give them instructions as to how they wanted the money handled and disbursed. They would meet from time to time and periodically call a general meeting of the subscribers and submit to the meeting their plans, and ask for instructions.

He thought Councillor Robertson's scheme was a very good one and very earefully worked out, but he did not think the time was yet ripe for putting such a scheme into operation.

The Rev. W. A. Morrison then moved that "This meeting resolves itself into a local Patriotic Association to hold and distribute this fund which has been collected in Iroquois Falls, for the best interests of the soldiers who have gone from our midst, and any other money collected at a later date shall also go towards the same
