Police Court News

On Thursday last, Mr. Poitras, appearing for the defence of Joe Gringua, charged with the theft of \$140 from Joe Tarbarga, asked Magistrate Atkinson for a reopening of the case on the grounds that when he undertook the defence of the prisoner, the previous week, he was not fully aware of the circumstances of the case. The magistrate granted the request.

NEW WITNESSES.

Mr. Poitras produced four new witnesses in the defence, who swore that at the time Tarbarga lost the money he was intoxicated, and that he told the witnesses several different stories as to the amount of money he had lost. Mr. Poitras in summing up the evidence given by the prisoner and the witnesses claimed that it could not be proved that the defendant stole the money. Although it had been shown that the prisoner's characteristic points had been none too good, regarding his past records of deserting his family, yet this did not necessarily mean that the man was dishonest.

PECULIAR CIRCUMSTANCES.

Magistrate Atkinson stated that the prisoner in his own evidence of the previous week told two different stories as to how he obtained the \$100 bill, and on this occasion he tells another story contradicting his previous evidence, showing that circumstantial evidence was a presumption of guilt. The magistrate said that he was satisfied, however, that the bill was lost in that particular house under peculiar circumstances, and turned up in the same house under the same peculiar circumstances, and he thought that if the prisoner was honest he would have told the plaintiff when he heard the bill was lost—that he had received an \$100 bill that same day from two mysterious men from Cobalt, of whom no trace could be found. Instead of doing so he went right away the next day and tried to dispose of the bill, which looked very suspicious.

ORDERED BILL RETURNED.

The magistrate decided, however, to have the \$100 bill returned to Tarbarga, under the circumstances and ordered Gringua to pay the costs of the court amounting to \$11.25 and to also pay Mr. Roche \$15 for the goods purchased at his store.
