Tenders for Pulpwood and Pine Limit

Tenders will be received by the undersigned up to and including the 1st day of February, 1917, for the right to cut pulpwood and pine timber on a certain area situated on the Black Sturgeon River and other territory adjacent thereto, in the District of Thunder Bay.

Tenders shall state the amount per cord on pulpwood, and per thousand feet board measure, on pine, that they are prepared to pay as a bonus in addition to dues of 40 cents per cord for spruce, and 20 cents per cord for other pulpwoods, and \$2.00 per thousand feet, board measure, for pine, or such other rates as may from time to time be fixed by the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council, for the right to operate a pulp mill and a paper mill on or near the area referred to.

Such tenderers shall be required to erect a mill or mills on or near the territory and to manufacture the wood into pulp and paper in the Province of Ontario.

Parties making tender will be required to deposit with their tender a marked cheque, payable to the Honorable the Treasurer of the Province of Ontario, for ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), which amount will be forfeited in the event of their not entering into agreement to carry out conditions, etc. The said \$10,000 will be applied on account of bonus dues as they accrue, but the regulation dues, as mentioned above, will require to be paid in the usual manner as returns of cutting of wood and timber are received.

RATEPAYERS OF MONETA TOWNSHIP VERY INDIGNANT

The ratepayers of Moneta Township met in the Schoolhouse on Wednesday evening last for the purpose of appointing a candidate to represent them on the Tisdale Township Council. About 18 ratepayers were present to discuss the treatment they had received at the hands of the present Council.

Chairman Wainwright, who was in charge of the meeting, stated that a couple of the members had visited the Council meeting in South Porcupine, held on the previous evening, to ask for various improvements that were needed in the Township, such as lights, drinking water, fire protection, and grading of roads.

The chairman stated that the Council had received tax collections in the neighborhood of \$30,200, and out of this they had a back debt to pay of about \$20,000, which meant there was very little left to make the necessary improvements required. "But," said the speaker, "The Council promised that the taxes collected from this Township in future will be spent on the Township."

The members of the meeting seemed somewhat bigoted in their opinions against the present council, in that they had not done what should have been done for the residents of Moneta. Therefore it was decided to appoint a member and elect him as the representative of Moneta. Rochester and Gillies' Lake to look after the interests of the citizens at this end of the Township.

The chairman stated that they had until the 30th of November to put all the residents entitled to a vote, on the voters' list, and that two members should be appointed to canvass the three Townships and see that every member's name thus entitled to a vote was put on the list.

Police Constable Hurtubise was asked if he would help with the list, but absolutely refused, saying that he would not have anything to do with the elections whatever, because the time did not allow him the opportunity to attend to anything outside his regular duties as policeman.

The policeman's statement aroused the indignation of the chairman, who stated that the former grievance or petition that was now pending against the Constable would not be withdrawn.

Two members were then appointed to procure a copy of the voters' list and go through it and all residents whose names were not on the list were to be put on to make sure of strong support in electing their representative.

The ratepayers ordered Mr. Wainwright to have some bills printed and distributed to every resident in Rochester, Gillies' Lake and Moneta, announcing a meeting to be held on Friday evening, Nov. 10th in Moneta Schoolhouse for the purpose of airing their grievances before Reeve Dickson and the Township Council.

The meeting then adjourned.

CLAIMED NO CASE.

Mr. Devaney, who appeared on behalf of the defendant, asked that the case be dismissed, contending that although the defendant agreed with the second party to jointly purchase the liquor, yet it could not be proven that it was procured for beverage purposes. Therefore the word "agent" within the meaning of the Ontario Temperance Act did not apply to the defendant, for he was neither agent or canvasser or receiver of the seller.

FINER POINT OF LAW.

This brings the case to be decided on by the finer points of law, as to whether the defendant could be really an agent within the meaning of the Act on the grounds that he with the second party jointly agreed to purchase the liquor for their own use.

The magistrate stated that the defendant came under the words "agent and receiver" because he had accepted money for the purchase of the liquor, received and distributed the same, showing that he was an agent to the second party. The fine was \$50 and costs.

Mr. Devaney then asked the magistrate to give a stated case, but the magistrate refused stating that it was not within his power or jurisdiction.

The Magistrate, however reserved his decision for a week.

It is believed that if the magistrate's decision stands with the fine imposed the case will be appealed to a higher court. This case will be of interest and worth while watching.
