REPAIRING ROADS.

Another ratepayer told the Councillors that the roads they had attempted to repair were now just as bad as before they were touched.

You were in a hurry to have the roads put into shape and we sent the men to do what they could for the money we had to expend, said the Reeve. I know your roads are in bad shape and I can assure that they will be repaired as soon the money is available. I have statements here showing that the Council has spent more money in Moneta than it has received from the taxes. The taxes received last year from this Township was \$1,800.12 and we have spent \$1,820.49, \$20.37 more than we have received.

REMOVAL OF POLICEMAN.

The former petition submitted to the Council for the removal of the policeman from this Township on the grounds it was thought to be extra expenses to be borne by the citizens was next discussed.

Councillors Black, Boyle and Thompson stated that the reports of Constable Hurtubise showed that he had maintained peace and harmony amongst the citizens, and that his convictions with fines more than offset his salary.

Police Constable Hurtubise was then called upon to give an account of his work done during his three months' duty in Moneta. He cited several instances where he had protected the citizens from various riots, bawdy houses, gambling joints, etc., which was unbeknown to them, and stated that he had conducted himself in a respectable manner and defied anyone in the audience to dispute his words.

The petitioners after hearing the constables statement moved to have the petition rescinded, which was carried unanimously.

There being no more questions to answer the Reeve asked the meeting if it was their intention to have a candidate represent Moneta on next year's Council to appoint an honest man and the whole Township would turn out and work for his election.

Chairman Wainwright then suggested that the candidate they would bring out should run independent of either party.

The meeting then adjourned, the ratepayers feeling somewhat comforted as to the reports of the Township Council and their work.
