Tenders for Pulpwood and Pine Limit

Tenders will be received by the undersigned up to and including the 1st day of February, 1917, for the right to cut pulpwood and pine timber on a certain area situated on the Black River and other territory adjacent thereto, in the District of Thunder Bay.

Tenderers shall state the amount per cord on pulpwood, and per thousand feet board measure, on pine, that they are prepared to pay as a bonus in addition to dues of 40 cents per cord for spruce, and 20 cents per cord for other pulpwoods, and \$2.00 per thousand feet, board measure, for pine, or such other rates as may from time to time be fixed by the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council, for the right to operate a pulp mill and a paper mill on or near the area referred to.

Such tenderers shall be required to erect a mill or mills on or near the territory and to manufacture the wood into pulp and paper in the Province of Ontario.

Parties making tender will be required to deposit with their tender a marked cheque, payable to the Honorable the Treasurer of the Province of Ontario, for ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), which amount will be forfeited in the event of their not entering into agreement to carry out conditions, etc. The said \$10,000 will be applied on account of bonus dues as they accrue, but the regulation dues, as mentioned above, will require to be paid in the usual manner as returns of cutting of wood and timber are received.

RAPID PROGRESS IN DEVELOPMENT WORK ON DAVIDSON MINE

The new managing engineer, Mr. Frank G. Stevens, took charge of operations a little over a week ago, and has more aggressive development policy which he has inaugurated is already bringing results. On the 100-foot level a raise was started above the west drift, and the first cut taken out exposed a face of ore eight feet wide which promises to carry high values. The purpose of this work is threefold—it will enable the management to determine definitely the grade and tonnage of the ore body on the first level, it will place the ore body in better shape for stoping, and will improve the ventilation and general working efficiency of the mine. It is probable that raising will also be done from the 200 to the 100-foot level as soon as the survey of underground development has been completed.

We understand that, as soon as the ore-shoot is developed as outlined in the present working program, a small test mill will be installed. In addition to giving a line on the best manner of treatment this will go far toward paying the running expenses of the mine.

Development work is making rapid progress on the 300-foot level with favorable results. Owing to the delays a delivery of machinery on order and to the scarcity of labor, the company has been held up to a certain extent but operations are now proceeding satisfactorily, and everything points to the blocking out of a considerable tonnage of high grade millable ore at this depth.

Two small veins, both carrying free gold, have been picked up in the No. 2 shaft, which is down about 50 feet in the spectacular vein discovered on the south claim early in the fall. This lead dipped from the shaft about a month ago, but the two discoveries made last week indicate that very satisfactory results, in addition to the progress made in sinking, are being experienced. It is planned to continue this shaft to the 100-foot level and then run a crosscut to pick up the No. 2 vein at that depth.
