**Three Men Up Before Magistrate
Torrance and Contribute
\$125 Each and Costs**

Leo, Maseoli, Alex. Maseoli and Louis Garicio were up before Judge Torrance Wednesday morning at Timmins on a charge of assault and carrying concealed weapons.

The assault was against one Mike Kasick and the charge was laid by the police. The men had guns in their possession when arrested.

The fight or assault occurred on the T. & N. O. platform and seemed to have arisen out of sympathy and talk for and against the strike.

The Maseoli brothers and Garicio were fined \$100 each for carrying concealed weapons and the two Maseoli brothers \$25 each for assault. Mike Kasick was fined \$5 and costs for being in the fight. In the testimony given it was difficult to tell just who in the wrong so far as assaulting was concerned as both sides denied being the aggressors.

**FLAGGED TRAIN
AND BOMBARDED
CAR WITH STONES**

Every Window on Special Car of Strike Breakers Was Broken But Men Escaped Uninjured

WHO DID THE WORK

No Arrests Have Been Made For Car Wrecking and Union Disclaim Any Part in It

The special C.P.R. train which arrived in from Toronto late Monday night was flagged at Rosedale just South of Porcupine and all the windows smashed with stones and clubs. The car was then allowed to go on to Timmins. Out of the fifty or sixty men in this car, sixteen of them went to work and the balance went over to the Union.

Of the men who came in on the special Monday morning and were quartered at the Hotel Goldfields only one succeeded in getting to work.

On the regular passenger train No. 47 there were a number of men coming in to work, but none were allowed to get away and all joined in with the miners.

There is going to be considerable trouble from now on between the Thiel men and the striking miners, but there is not much question that the two big mines are going to be kept running in the face of any and all difficulties.

In the mean time business is going to be unsettled, the smaller properties will be put to much extra expense and have a loss of time which can be ill-afforded at this stage of development and in the end their is nothing but experience going to be gained, only dead waste and loss of money and time.

Who flagged this special car? No one seems to know and the police have no information which will lead to any arrests.

The Union disclaim any knowledge of the affair. The blame however is bound to rest on the shoulders of the strikers or strike sympathizers as it is argued that no one else would have any motive for the depredation.

That the Thiel men would turn the trick to enlist sympathy and stir up a more bitter feeling is hardly reasonable, but possible.

Inspector Greer of Toronto arrived in camp Wednesday night and will ferret out the men who took part in the wrecking of this car. The offense is a most serious one and means six years in case of conviction.

**THIEL MEN
OUT ON BAIL**

**Four Detectives Arrested For
the Shooting at Timmins on
Last Monday**

The four Thiel Detectives who were arrested Monday morning for the shooting at Timmins had their hearing Tuesday morning before Magistrate Torrance at Timmins and were allowed out on \$500.00 bail.

The Thiel men arrested were Ernest Dredge, E. Charles, F. A. Luke and Norman Dodds.

In future the Thiel Constables are not to be allowed to patrol the street and highways, but to be restricted to the property of the mines.

This order will undoubtedly have a quieting effect and avoid any clashes between the detectives and strikers.

Should any attempt be made to rush any of the mines the property will undoubtedly be protected no matter what the consequence.

The provincial police will look after the law and order in the different towns and are fully able to cope with any disturbance.

**Again Postponed
The Sale**
