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STRIKING MINERS WILL BE SUMMONED

To Answer to the Charge of Violating the Industrial Disputes Act of Canada

Upon the information and complaint of P. A. Robbins, manager of the Hollinger Mine, the strikers who left work on or about the 14th of November will be summoned to appear on the 10th of December at the Court House at Timmins, charged with violating the Industrial Act of Canada by going out on a strike contrary to law. There is a law on the statute books which in brief says that no body of men shall go on a strike without notification or arbitration under penalty of \$10 per day. The mines and other employers of labor are similarly bound in the case of a lockout.

Whether this law or act is agreeable to the constitution has never been tested in a case of this kind.

Change of Time

On Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway, Effective December 2nd

There is a change of time on the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway, which went into effect, December 2nd, 1912.

Trains Nos. 3 and 4 will operate between Englehart and Latchford only, the service from Cobalt to Latchford having been discontinued.

The order was issued from North Bay on the 27th of November and signed by W. A. Griffin, Supt. of Traffic and A. J. Parr, General Freight and Passenger Agent.

Rube Marquard has been sued in New York by Joseph Cohn for alienating the affections of Cohn's wife. The great pitcher denies that he had anything to do with Cohn's wife except to act as her partner in a vaudeville stunt and that all relations were only of a commercial nature.

SPORTING

Chief Jones, the one time famous goal keeper for the American Soo in the International league and last year with the local team of Cochrane will guard the net this winter for an Eastern professional team.

Another surprise was sprung in hockey circles last Saturday, when it was found out that Ernie Johnston had departed for the coast where he will play hockey this winter unless he changes his mind on arriving there. When Johnston signed his Wandered contract, it was this season's form and contains a clause of which will make it legally good. Action will be taken against Johnston and the matter fought to the finish.

Ottawa Citizen:—"Within two or three years professional hockey clubs will be things of the past. The game will be soon controlled entirely by the rink people." A well-known Ottawa business man, who has followed sport for many years, made the foregoing prophecy last night. He based his prediction on the fact that Toronto has an artificial ice arena, whose shareholders are also associated with that at Montreal. Ottawa is to have an arena within a year or so, and plans for one has also been made at Quebec.

"When this chain of eastern arenas is established in the east," he continued, "they will get together and freeze out the clubs altogether. Do not think that they are to continue paying out half of their receipts to hockey clubs, so that officers of the latter may line their pockets with gold. Not much. With the coming of the new arenas at Quebec and Ottawa, away will go hockey clubs. As a matter of fact, it was suggested some weeks ago that Toronto, Montreal and Ottawa capital be merged in the construction of rinks at Ottawa and Quebec. The scheme is still under consideration.

SIN OF IMPURITY GREATEST OF ALL

Fred B. Smith of New York Says Drink and Gambling Take Second Place to It

GAMBLERS THIEVES

And He Says The Man Who Will Bet Will Put His Hand In Your Pocket and Steal

"I have seen drink drag down one of the most intellectual men of a large city until he became a murderer and a suicide, and I have seen the gambling habit pull down bright young men out of trusted positions, dragging themselves and their family into disgrace; but, gentlemen, let me tell you, I've seen impurity do more than that," declared Fred B. Smith of New York, to a tremendous audience of men in the Strand Theatre last Monday evening.

"If ever this great Anglo-Saxon race goes down into defeat, it will be this demoralizing licentiousness and impurity which will be the cause of it. I don't say there are no meaner and debasing sins than the one I speak of, but I do say there is no sin which makes itself so common a foe to the man trying to be a Christian. There is not a man in this hall who has not at some period in his life faced tremendous temptation in regard to it."

Gambling and drinking were touched upon briefly by the speaker, but left aside for the dealing with the greater evil. "The Sin That Kill." In regard to gambling, Mr. Smith declared that a gambler is a thief "Any man who will bet on a horse race, a football game, or a game of cards, will put his hand into your pocket and steal."

Ovide Latremouille, once the champion athlete of the Toronto police force has been sentenced to Kingston penitentiary for seven years. The charge against him was that of robbery while carrying an offensive weapon.
