## IN THE MAIL BAG

From the Front and Elsewhere

November 25th, 1916.  
South Camp, Seaford, Eng.  
Rev. Father Theriault,  
Timmins, Ont.

Dear Father:  
I take pleasure in writing you and giving you news of life out here.

Father, this is certainly some country and camp. We are in the south part of England near the coast, and there is a nice town a half mile from here called Brighton. The camp grounds is only a hill, and before you get to the top you have to lie down and rest. One thing I like about it is that we can have a salt water bath every night and we can then walk back to camp in our bare feet. The fields out here are still green and there is no sign of winter.

Last Sunday we had mass in the Y.M.C.A. Rev. Father McDonald from Nova Scotia is our chaplain. He is quite old, and very nice, and we expect he will be with us until we cross to France.

We are having our King's Pass on Wednesday and I am going to Dublin and Belfast in Ireland. I will then be able to let you know what that country looks like.

As you probably know our trip across is not to be disclosed, and therefore I am rather short of news.

I surely know what it is to be seasick, and do not wish for any more of it.

Please write me soon and give me some news of home and Timmins.

I saw Mae Lang a few minutes ago and he is quite well and sends you his best regards.
