## Timmins News in Brief

Mr. Len Wilson of Peterson Lakes succeeded Mr. Broad as master mechanic at the West Dome Mine.

Mr. Matt. Balvin returned on Friday from a business trip to Toronto and other southern points.

Mr. Wm. G. Smith left on the noon train yesterday in response to a wire from his home in Elora to the effect that his sister was seriously ill there.

Mr. Bert Poirer, Consulting Engineer of the Vipond-North Thompson, returned on Thursday to New York after spending a week or ten days at the mines.

Mr. Geo. Kingston, tie contractor for the Canada Government Railways, was a business visitor in town the past few days, leaving for the West yesterday.

Last week Dick Cole was charged before H. E. Montgomery, J. P., with a breach of the town by-law against drunkenness, and was fined \$10 and costs.

The skating rink at the Porcupine Crown mine is worthy of a note. As one of the visitors to it recently remarked, "It sure is some fine big rink for the kids, old and young." And, as another man explained, "It is the fine tennis court disguised for the season."

Among the recruits secured by the 228th Northern Fusiliers, Railway Construction Battalion, this week, were Fred. Bailey, electrician at the Hollinger, and Wilfred Deacon, of the Hollinger staff. Four other recruits were secured on one other day this week.

In a letter just received from Pte. Dan. McLellan, now on active service in France, confirmation is given to the sad news reported here of the death in action of Lieut. Len. Dunsford. Lieut. Dunsford had been wounded, and before returning to the trenches, had won his lieutenant's commission. He was only back in the trenches a day or two before he was killed.

From a letter received here it would appear that Mr. Dey, who was fire chief here for a very brief time, and who returned to Collingwood for Christmas, sending back the season's good wishes instead of returning himself, is not again chief of the Collingwood brigade, as The Advance was informed, but is now employed in the big shipyards at Collingwood.

Out of a total staff of about 3,200, over 1,200 employees of the Canadian Bank of Commerce have enlisted since the opening of the war. Of these 84 have been killed, 175 wounded, 20 ill, 8 missing, and 9 prisoners of war. Nearly 1,000 of those enlisting went as privates, though 168 of these have risen to non-commissioned rank since entering the service.

According to the Toronto papers, Joseph Foley, alias Joseph Thomas, and known to the police as "Doc" Foley, was arrested in the city last week charged with obtaining credit on false pretences. According to the police he secured a furnished house from an old lady on the strength of a story that he and his wife were motoring down from the Porcupine, where he claimed to be a prominent mining man, and the motor breaking down he had to come on to secure accommodation. He gave her \$5.00 of the \$50 rent, saying he had paid the balance to the agent. In three or four days he left the house, and the waterpipes were frozen. The owner of the building complained to the police who eventually secured the accused.
