FLAX AS PROFITABLE CROP FOR NORTH LAND

Makes Good Ration to Go With Clover Hay for Stock. Fibre is Worth \$4.50 Per Ton.

Mr. R. H. Clemens, Superintendent of Monteith Government Farm, writes The Advance as follows:—
"My attention has been drawn to the fact that flax can be very profitably grown in all parts of Temiskaming. It is true that there have been many failures, but this is always the case when we are not thoroughly familiar with the crop.
"It usually happens that flax grow-

ers do not sow the seed half thick enough. Flax should be sown broad-cast by hand at the rate of about 84 lbs. of seed to the acre. The Blue Blossom Dutch Child variety gives the best possible results here. The White Blossom yields more bushels of seed, but is about three weeks later than the Blue Blossom.
"One of the greatest needs in the north country, with the settler who has stock to feed, is to get a suitable ration to feed with clover hay. Clover hay alone makes an excellent food, but it is generally found that cattle require a more succulent ration or some food that will have a loosening effect on the bowels. Flax is not a succulent food, but it contains an oil which when fed in small quantities has a very fine effect on the health of the animal. It is true turnips do very well over our whole district, but they require an extremely well-worked soil. In fact it is almost absolutely necessary to have the ground well worked in the fall and also in the spring. Turnips should never be sown unless the ground has been thoroughly worked and is in a loose, open, mellow condition. With flax it is a little different. If it has a rich soil and gets a good start it is likely to yield a fair crop. Wire worm and other such pests never bother it. It can be sown in amongst the stumps on uneven, rough soil. Small quantities of it can be harvested with a cradle or a scythe and threshed with a flail. It will yield from five to twenty-five bushels per acre and few bushels of this will go a long way when fed to stock one handful at a time.

Mr. Jas. A. McCracken, secretary of the Canadian Flax Growers Assn., St. Mary's Ont., could give you full information regarding flax-growing both for fibre and for seed. He states in the Agricultural War Book of 1916 that Canadian fibre is worth \$450 per ton.
"Our experiments with flax here on the farm would lead us to believe that a great deal more of it should be grown on our rough, stumpy land and we look forward with interest to the time when flax will be grown in large quantities over the whole district. I am sure that we would be glad to hear from any settler who is interested in flax growing."
