## COUNCIL DISCUSS THE

were given, and he amended his resolution, seconded by C. G. Williams, to read as follows:—

"That this Council express its great regret at the necessity of cutting off the Toronto train. While we realize the unusual conditions, we would point out the great inconvenience this district suffers in mail, express and passenger service by this action, and we would ask that every effort be made to remedy this at the earliest possible moment. In the meantime we would strongly urge that the daily noon service to Porquis be continued." Carried.

The matter of the return of the costs taken by Mr. W. H. Wilson, J.P., in the trial last October of the men accused of gambling was again before Council. Through the decision in the recent appeal the costs were ordered paid back to the parties. Councillor Globe explained that Mr. Wilson had tried the case in good faith, following the town by-law, and doing the work entitling him to the costs. It was through no fault of Mr. Wilson's that the costs had now to be returned, and Councillor Globe thought the Town should shoulder the responsibility, and pay back the costs in this particular. The Council agreed to this without dissent. A similar order in reference to costs concerning Chief Craft was disposed of by the Chief explaining that he had already returned the costs involved to the Division Court Clerk.

Messrs. John Dalton and Hurlboise addressed the Council in reference to the matter of licenses for drays, liveries, etc. It was explained by Councillor Williams that the whole question was now under consideration by the Committee, information being gathered, etc., and final decision would likely be made at the next regular meeting.

On motion of Councillors Williams and Moore it was decided to take the steps suggested by the Town Solicitor's letter to make application for free express delivery in town.

Mr. Hamblly was ordered a refund of water rates on a property which he had not occupied during the time for which he had paid the rates.

Final arrangements were endorsed for the purchase of the lots at the Mattagami Townsite where the town pipe line crosses.

The by-law appointing Alexander Borland Fire Chief and Building Inspector for the Town of Timmins, at a salary of \$125 per month with free house, water and light, for the term of one year, was given its respective readings and finally passed.

Mayor McLaughlin read a letter from Mr. Englehart of the T. & N.O., re the proposed overhead bridge, promising every consideration and thoughtful care to the proposition.

Mr. F. C. H. Sims was appointed auditor at a salary of \$175 a year.

J. A. Latimer, recently of Ottawa, but an old resident of the Porcupine, was appointed assessor at a salary of \$480 per year and also tax collector at \$110 per month, a total salary of \$1,800 per year.

In giving the Finance Committee's report, Councillor Moore again emphasized the pressing necessity for economy and care in expenditures.

The payroll and some other accounts were ordered paid.

It was decided to have a by-law prepared to issue debentures for the \$5,000 already spent on waterworks capital account for extension of mains, and for \$6,000 for further extensions planned. It was pointed out by Councillor Brazeau that this expenditure on capital account was responsible in quite a measure for running the town "short" in the general account, and that the sale of debentures would remedy this.

The matter of giving fire protection to Moneta was again before the Council. Councillor Globe pointed out the danger of the town assuming responsibility which might jeopardize the town's own protection. He pointed out the one best remedy was for the Township to put in a pumping plant at Gillies Lake. Dr. McInnis explained that he understood that plans were now under way for a plant at Moneta. He said it was distinctly understood that the Town was to be under no obligation in the matter, only to help out in case of need, if terms for the service could be arranged. After some discussion it was decided that the Fire and Light Committee, the Fire Chief, and the Town Engineer, meet the representatives of Moneta, discuss the matter and report back to Council.

Councillor Brazeau referred to the need of a sewerage system as most important for the town's health, sanitation, cleanliness and convenience. He asked if there was no way by which debentures could be issued to secure the necessary sewerage for the Town.

Referring to the matter of protection from forest fires, Councillor Globe said he understood from excellent authority that practically nothing

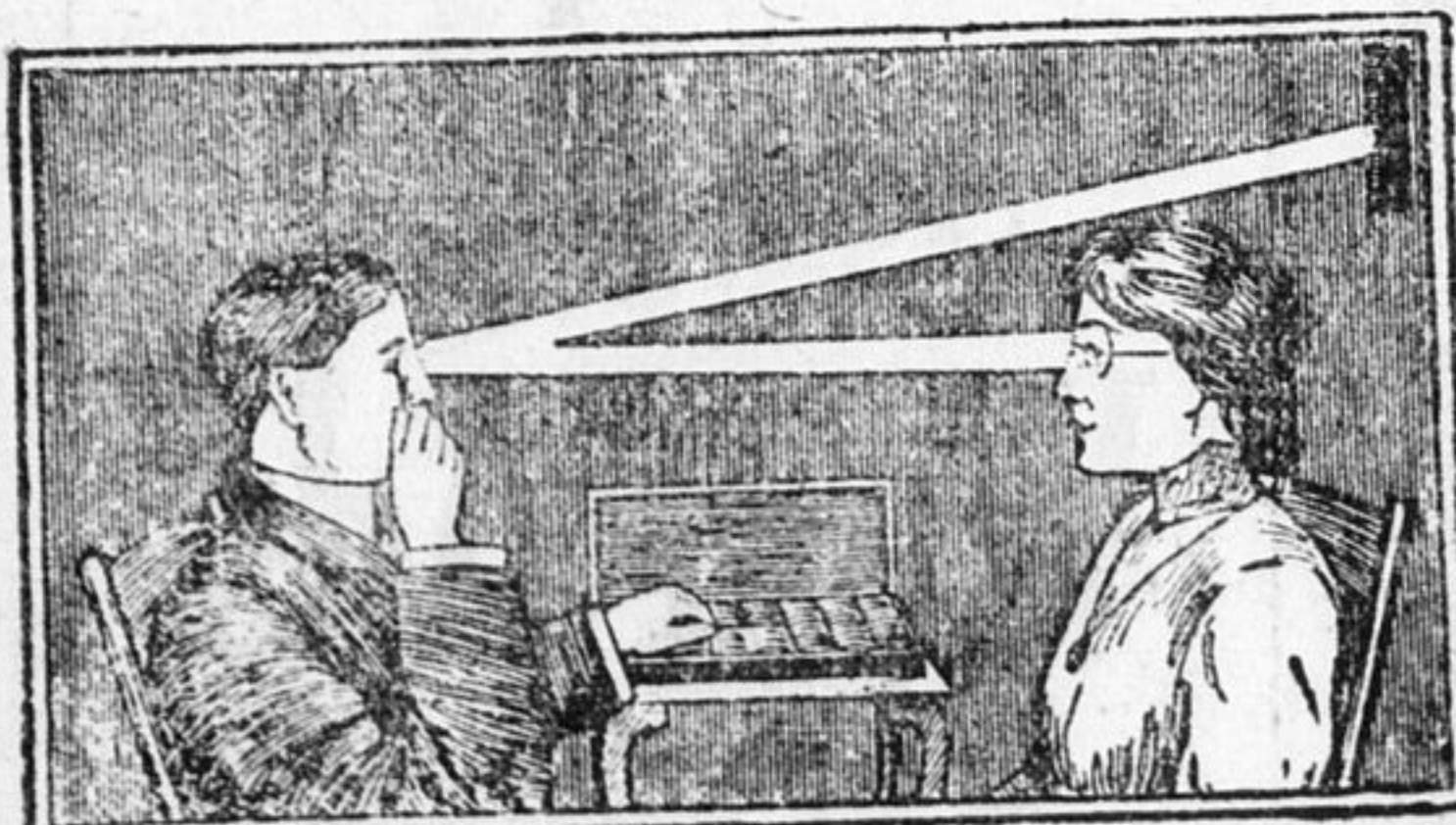

According to his authority, the Government intends to enforce a system of permits for burning slash, etc., and also to furnish some portable chemical extinguishers for fighting fires that may start. Outside of this, however, he understood that nothing further was contemplated for this year.
