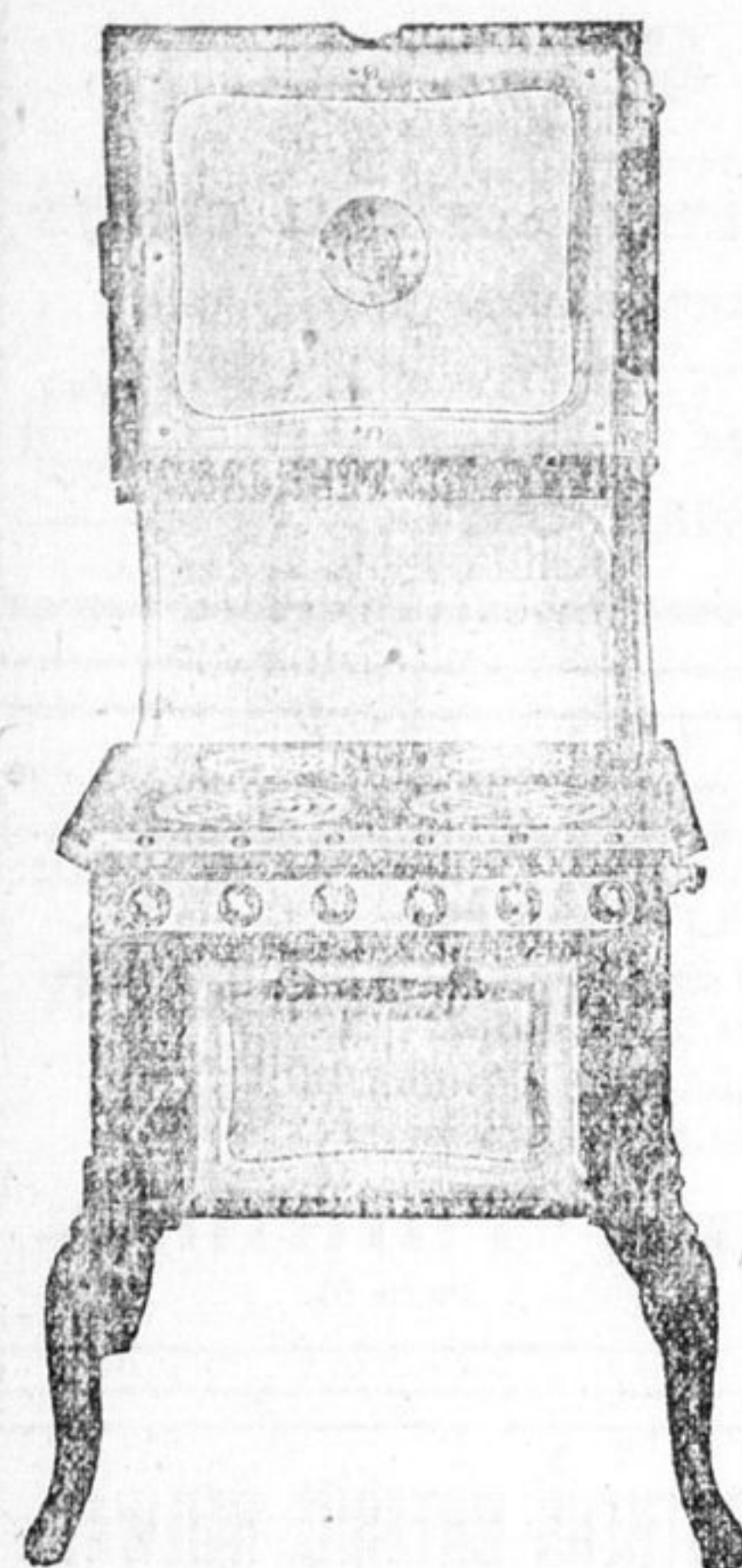

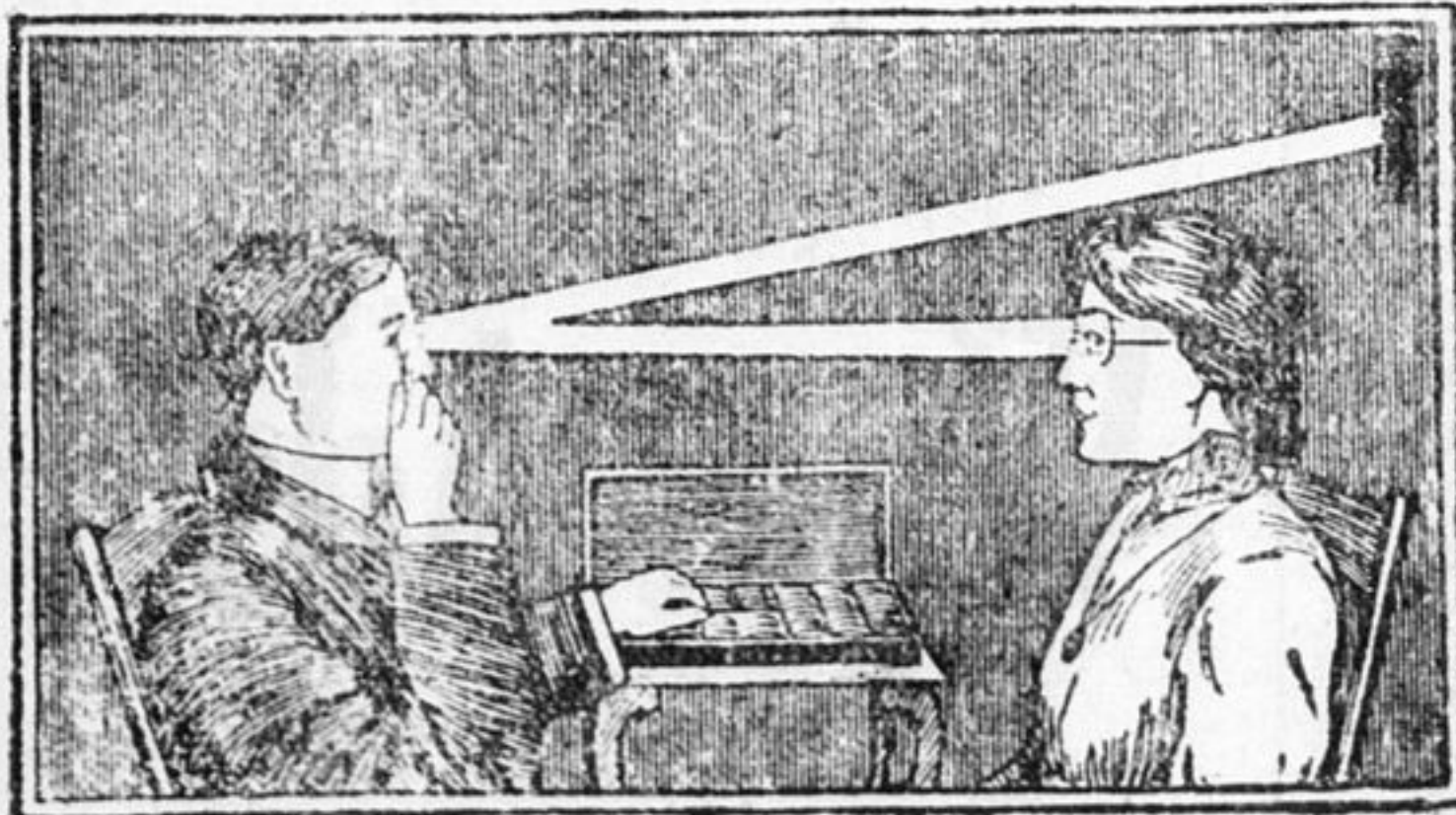

TO BLACK AN EYE COMES RATHER HIGH

gested the playing for money, Capra virtuously declined, and stood by the door of another room preparatory to going out. Then the accused men entered and one of them hit him on the head and knocked him down while the other seemed to strike him with a chair. He suspected that the reason for this assault was that the men thought he had "tipped off" the police to search the place, but he hadn't. The story of the two accused men was somewhat different. They said it was Capra who wanted to play cards for "da mon," and in consequence of this wicked action they said the Zaeta who rented the place delegated them to put him out of the virtuous house. Again they said, Capra objected and grabbed one of them by the beautiful shock of his hair. In the scuffle, perhaps, Capra came by his injuries. Dr. McInnes gave evidence as to Mr. Capra's condition. His eye (Capra's not the Dr's) was blackened and swollen and he had been struck apparently on the back with something not very soft. The injuries, the Dr. considered, would lay Capra off from work for two or three days and entail a medical bill of \$5.00. Provincial Officer Aekroyd told of the blood, bruises and abrasions on the complainant the night of the event, and also that the defendants had admitted when they were arrested that they had pushed Capra out of the door. Mr. Eli Anderson gave evidence like Dickens' boy "Jo," who "didn't know nothing nohow." After this the Magistrate listened to the arguments of the learned counsel. For the defendants, Mr. Devaney minimized the seriousness of the offense on the grounds that there had been a quarrel as to the proposal to play cards for money and the accused acting on instructions from the proprietor of the house had put the complainant outdoors. No serious harm, however, had been done. Mr. Forbes, for Mr. Capra, classed the affair as an unprovoked assault, the only question being why it occurred. The Magistrate said there had undoubtedly been an assault and that it was hardly necessary to so beat up a man in simply escorting him outdoors. To emphasize this idea he imposed a fine of \$50 and costs on each of the accused, the doctor's bill to come out of this amount, which meant that the two men paid \$60.50 each for the event.

When Provincial officer Aekroyd took a notion to raid the Bank Saloon recently he found a Valentine there. Thinking it a comic Valentine "d'beeg polecece" took it along with him. Consequently, Val. was charged Thursday with being intoxicated in a place other than a private residence. On behalf of Mr. English, Solicitor T. H. Torrance admitted that his client was what is scientifically known as boozed, but he was dutifully sleeping it off in his own private office. Also there was no evidence to show that he had any liquor on the premises except what was concealed even beyond the long reach of "d'beeg polecece," unless a divining rod were used, or words to that effect. As the private office connects with the bar, the Magistrate later imposed a fine of \$14 and costs.
