Municipalities, as Well as Individuals May Learn From Record of Armies

The Toronto Health Department issues a monthly "health bulletin," and a recent number was a "war number." This bulletin seemed to answer many of the questions put to returned soldiers as to how it is possible to maintain the health of the

soldiers at the front or even in training. Incidentally, as The World observes, it contains all the principles of healthful living.

There is much to be learned by civilians from the military organization, "says the bulletin." In sanitation this is found to be singularly effective. Esprit de corps works in this as in other things with the result that of some men are inclined to be lax in obeying regulations, not only the officers but the men enforce the rules. The clean men of the company for their own safety and comfort demand cleanliness of the others." In this there is a hint for municipalities. If towns can foster and increase the pride of cleanliness among the many, one of the difficulties of the sanitation problem will be overcome.

Of course, organization and skilled attention are the chief factors in military sanitation, but there are other things that help, such as a friendly rivalry for appearances. "There exists," says the bulletin, "a certain pride of station, platoon, company, regiment or brigade, which demands that their particular unit be just as clean and smart as the unit alongside of them." As The World says "if this spirit were introduced into civic life for the house, the terrace, the street, the district, the influence would soon be shown."

Commenting on the contents of the bulletin The Toronto World says:—

"That it is worth while to pay attention to the laws of sanitation, diet and cleanliness is obvious from the fact that the death rate among the armies in the field from natural causes is only three per thousand, as compared with five per thousand among males of military age in times of peace. The soldiers are valuable as men in the army, and are looked after as carefully as children, regularly fed, warmly clothed, bathed and exercised as frequently as possible, and kept in first-class condition. Because of this he is able to throw almost any germ of disease that may attack him. The commonsense and comparatively simple general rules of health enforced in the army might well be adopted by everybody, to their own comfort and health, and the prolongation of their lives. It often takes people a long time to learn that health is a greater gift than wealth, or learning, or fame, or position, or power. These things may be had without health, but they lose their finest flavor without the crowning blessing of life untainted."

Part of the lack of outside knowledge of the Town is due to its newness. And part is also undoubtedly due to the fact that everybody in Timmins has not been boosting Timmins.
