**Timmins News in Brief**

Mr. Robert H. Bryce, Toronto, consulting engineer for the Krist-Thompson is in Camp this week.

Mr. H. P. Rust, New York, consulting engineer for the power companies is in Camp.

Mrs. M. A. Ellis, Honorary President of the D.Y.B. Club, left for Cobalt on Monday, where she will spend the Easter holidays with her mother Mrs. Boyle.

The regular monthly meeting of the Byrnes Presbyterian Ladies' Aid, will be held in the church on Thursday, April 5th, at two-thirty p. m.

There will be a big Dance held in the Finlanders' Hall on the evening of Tuesday, April 10th, with good music and other attractions, including some valuable prizes.

There will be a tea given at the Presbyterian Manse on Thursday, April the 12th from 3 to 6 o'clock; also sale of fancy work, home-made cooking and candy.

Owing to the snow blockade and the consequent cancellation of the train service, Bishop Anderson was unable to be here for Sunday, but will be here to conduct the Confirmation service this (Wednesday) evening at 7.30 in St. Matthew's church.

Several local business men have recently taken up again the plan of having The Porcupine Advance map of the district printed on the back of their envelopes as aid to "putting Timmins on the map" to the general outside public. The map shows the exact location of this big town and the plan is a good one for "advertising Timmins."

Saturday evening about 10 o'clock the firemen had a call to Mr. T. Lawlor's, 47 Elm street, and another record run was made and good work accomplished after the run. The fire, which originated from an exploding lamp, was soon extinguished, the chief damage being from smoke and water. The loss is small and covered by insurance.

His many friends here will regret that Mr. Homer L. Gibson is in the hospital at Toronto suffering with appendicitis, but they will be pleased to know that at last reports he was making very satisfactory progress towards recovery. Mr. Gibson underwent an operation yesterday and word was received here this morning that the operation was entirely successful and that he came through the ordeal in fine condition and has now a splendid start to complete recovery.

Mrs. H. McQuarrie is taking her little girl to Toronto for treatment again for her eyes. It will be recalled that some months ago the little girl ran to meet her father returning from work and as he picked her up to greet her a particle of dust fell from his hat into her eye. Later a cataract developed on the eye, and the child has been troubled ever since. There will be a general hope that the treatment now being taken will prove entirely successful and that the youngster will be completely restored to health and vision.

The Timmins fire brigade grows in popularity. This is a pleasing thing to note, but it is still more pleasing to see that the good work of the brigade is appreciated publicly. In another column will be found a card of thanks, publicly expressing appreciation, and this, together with the generous appreciation of Dalton Bros. as recently expressed, should "sound nice" to the firemen particularly in view of the fact that they deserve it all and more. Mrs. Lawlor said this week:—"It is a great comfort, surely, to all to know that we have such an able brigade, ready to answer a call so quickly, and work so well."

Mr. H. M. Paull leaves to-day for The Pas, Manitoba, to conduct extensive prospecting and exploration operations for a large English Syndicate. The property in Mr. Paull's charge is north-west of The Pas, and the prospecting will be for copper, gold, and other minerals. Mr. Paull has engaged six other experienced and skilled prospecting men in this Camp, and these men will join him at The Pas in about a month,—when the snow clears away so that work may be prosecuted effectively. The prospectors thus engaged by Mr. Paull are said to be among the very best in this Camp, and there is every reason to believe that the work will prove successful if ability and experience can make it so, and as the section is a very promising one there need be little question on this score.

According to the St. Matthew's Magazine, "the Easter floral decorations will be placed in the church on the afternoon of Saturday, April 7th,—3 till 6 p.m.,—and all the ladies of the congregation are invited to come and help put them in place."

In a recent issue of a Renfrew newspaper announcement is made of the death on Saturday, March 3rd, 1917, of Mary A. Baker, wife of Alexander Stirling, aged 35 years. Mr. Stirling is Government Road Inspector for this district, and his many friends in the Porcupine will extend sympathy to him in his loss.

Contractor Pearson, who was making the alterations on the building designed as a drug store on Third Avenue near A. Brazeau's plumbing shop, was instructed by one of the Town Councillors that the work was contrary to the Town Building By-law. Apparently he did not pay much attention to Councillors. Then the Fire Chief gave the contractor the same information, but apparently he paid the same attention to fire chiefs. At last Chief Craft called his attention to the informalities, and the Contractor apparently thought as little of Police Chiefs as of Councillors or Fire Chiefs. This gave him a better respect at least for Police chiefs, and the work was discontinued forthwith, until proper permit may be secured and the work carried on in conformity with the law of the Town.

**NOTICE.**

After the tenth day of April this year, all dogs not properly licensed or not wearing the tags required by law will be destroyed. In this connection public notice is called to Chapter 246, Sec. 7, sub-sections 1 and 2, reading as follows:—

7—(1) Where any person has been assessed for a dog and the collector has failed to collect the tax imposed by this Act, he shall report the same under oath to a Justice of the Peace, who shall, by an order under his hand and seal, to be served by any constable, require such dog to be destroyed by the owner thereof, or by a constable.

(2) For the purpose of carrying out such order the constable may enter on the premises of such owner and destroy such dog.
