The Timmins Rod and Gun Club have secured a new site for their ranges. The new site, near M. Boivin's is convenient to town and will be fitted up and equipped for this season's work.

Mr. Forsyth, of the Dome staff, leaves this week for his home in Virginia. A presentation was made to him last week by members and friends of the office staff of the Dome all of whom regret his departure.

Mr. Dick Cowan is leaving the electrical staff of the Dome Mine to go back to his home in Belleville. "Dick" is one of the Camp's old-timers and will be missed by many friends here.

His many friends will regret to learn that Mr. A. H. Cook, of the McIntyre staff, is in St. Mary's Hospital here, suffering with an attack of appendicitis, and all will hope for him a speedy and complete recovery.
