The firemen had a call Thursday evening to a house near the English church. The response was a remarkably good one again, but happily the fire did not amount to anything, being only an overheated chimney.

Next Sunday, May 13th, will be "Mother's Day" in the Presbyterian church. In more southern places it is customary to wear a white flower in recognition or remembrance of "Mother" on this day.

Timmins Lodge I.O.O.F., No. 459, held their first annual church parade on Sunday morning to the Presbyterian church. An unusually large gathering was present at the church, and the sermon by Rev. J. Macdonald was one of the best fraternal addresses ever given to any Order in the North Land. After the usual business meeting adjourned lunch was served and the remainder of the evening spent in a social way, a number of young men joined the girls. He had been making shavings with a knife and dropping the open knife on the ground he proceeded to split a block of wood with an axe. Mr. Dreyer went inside and there pulled out the blade and hastily summoned a doctor. Local medical men advised him to go to Toronto for the treatment of specialists and according Mr. Dreyer left for the city last week.
