Timmins News in Brief

Mr. F. W. Schumacher left Camp for the South on Monday after a visit to the mine.

Mr. F. Culver returned to the south this week after a visit to the Schumacher Mine.

Mr. Wm. H. Hayden, of Buffalo, was a visitor to Camp this week, on a regular visit to the Hayden Mine.

The Italian Band favored the citizens with some more good music Sunday evening before the recruiting rally for the Fourth Forestry Draft.

The tennis season at St. Matthew's court was opened a week ago with a game of singles played by Mr. W. R. Dodge and Rev. J. D. Paterson. The court is dry and will be made ready for regular play at once. All members and adherents of the church are eligible for membership and are cordially invited to join.

Sincere sympathy will be extended by all to Provincial Officer Allen and Mrs. Allen in the sad death last week of their little girl, Doris Wilda Allen, aged 2 months and 7 days. The child took sick on Saturday, May 12. Dr. Thomas was called in and pronounced the trouble as bronchial pneumonia, but despite all that medical skill and care and attention could do, the child passed away on Tuesday. The remains were taken on Wednesday from Mr. and Mrs. Allen's home at South Porcupine to Cochrane for interment.

Ciro Gurino will come up to-morrow in the District Court at Haileybury before Judge Hartman, charged with assault on John Nolan, night watchman at the Vipond mine last December. The charge is reduced from that of attempted murder. Gurino, it will be remembered is the man arrested for assaulting John Nolan with an iron bar and inflicting injuries to the night watchman's head and body before he could be subdued. Mr. Nolan spent some time in the hospital as a result of the assault and Gurino has spent some time in jail.

Six per cent. debentures to the extent of \$35,000, guaranteed by the Ontario Government as to principal and interest, were recently sold by the Township of Tisdale, R. C. Matthews & Co., Toronto, being the purchasers.

Messrs. G. W. Muckle and J. H. Holmes, of Blenheim, were in Camp this week taking a view of the North Land. Mr. Muckle has a farm section in Murphy Township, one of the veteran grants, his father being one of those serving in the defence of Canada at the time of the Fenian Raid. They were at the recruiting meeting Sunday evening and hearing the word "Muirkirk" mentioned in one of the speeches they were down early Monday morning at The Advance office to find out what the editor knew about that village in far south-western Ontario, Muirkirk being only a few miles from their home town of Blenheim, but between 700 and 800 miles from Timmins by rail-road.

The street talk last week that "the strike had started" at the Schumacher Mine proved to be only another of the foolish and evil false rumors. The fact on which the rumor started was simply that about 15 men on the night shift had quit in a body Wednesday midnight. They were foreigners and for some reason had taken a dislike to their foreman and so wanted to quit work rather than continue under the shift boss. The management of the mine had no objection to the men quitting and they were paid off as soon as they applied at the office. The next rumor, "that the Mine had caused the arrest of a bunch of foreigners because they would not continue work," is equally malicious and untrue. Provincial Officer Allen was asked to visit Schumacher, and he did make a number of arrests and brought the accused men before Magistrate Atkinson on Thursday. They were charged with agitating and creating disorder and using improper methods to induce others to stop work. According to the story of the police, the accused men went around trying to persuade others to stop work, and caused considerable agitation by the impression that there was some sort of strike commenced. As the ring-leaders were chiefly alien enemies it was naturally felt that they should not be allowed to engage in such agitation unchecked. Magistrate Atkinson remanded the accused for a week. Work at the Schumacher Mine is proceeding as usual, no interference with affairs being caused by the little incidents referred to.

Mrs. John W. Fogg returned on Monday to Camp, after a visit to Toronto.

Miss Ida Higgins, of Bracebridge, was visiting friends in South Porcupine and Timmins during the past few days.

A "Military Tea" is to be held under the auspices of the ladies of St. Matthew's church at the home of Mrs. Meyers on Friday, May 25th, from 8 to 11 p.m.

Mr. E. A. Terrill, formerly of Campbellford, Ont., has opened a Bargain Store next to Stadlerman's Book Store, dealing in dry goods, fancy goods and novelties at less than ordinary prices.

South Porcupine Oddfellows are giving a "Cabaret" to-morrow evening for the Oddfellows and Rebekahs of the district. There will be cards, dancing, songs and a general good time, and the Oddfellows and Rebekahs from all over the Porcupine are invited to attend.

Not only did Chief Craft set a good example by cleaning up the yards behind and alongside his house and the station, even before "Clean-up Day" arrived, but he is also leading the way by starting little gardens in front and alongside the police station, even before the snow has stopped falling this summer.

Mr. J. D. McLean, of the fire department, received word on Sunday that his brother, Angus, had been killed in action on May 1st. He had been only back in the trenches about four months after a time spent in the hospital with wounds. He enlisted at New Liskeard in April, 1915. Another brother, Hector, formerly of the Hollinger, is now in France.

The Porcupine Platoon of the Fourth Forestry Draft has now all left town, Lieut. Gordon and Ptes. Widdifield, Neal, and Lalonde, the last here, leaving for Toronto the beginning of this week. Since the last issue of The Advance three more recruits were secured, A. Beaudin, H. Tallon and G. H. Clows, the first signing up on the 18th, the second on Sunday evening and the third on Monday morning.

The regular weekly meeting of the D.Y.B. Club was held at the home of Mrs. W. H. Wilson, on Monday, May 21st, with a large number present, Miss Muirhead presiding. After the usual work of the Club had been indulged in Mrs. Wilson served a dainty lunch, the remainder of the evening being spent in a social way. At the close of a very pleasant evening, the girls adjourned to meet next Monday evening at the home of Mrs. Brazeau. Work taken in: 18 prs. socks, 3 day shirts. Work given out: Wool for 10 prs. socks, 5 day shirts.

Messrs. Hall, Lightbody and Horner, of the Dome Mines, decided last week to do something for the sake of Greater Production, so they tackled the ploughing up of the athletic park for garden purposes. Their first difficulty was to get some animal to haul the plough. "I won't, Hall," says Horner. "A Lightbody wouldn't do for a heavy plough," says the second man. Neither would Hall haul. So they went down to the mines and got three more mules. They hitched the mules to the plough, and then the crowd gathered. Unaccustomed to soft ground, the mules slipped and fell and twisted, and so did the other three men. The furrows ran as straight as the C.N.R. through some subsidizing sections of the West. In some places the plough went down to the 200 and 300-foot levels, and at other times the crowd cheered the airship that passed over the park. The three patriots sweated profusely and swore politely, and the crowd had the most delightful social time of the season. When one mule got a whiplash in his mouth for a bit, Mr. Horner thought it time to call a halt, so he made a noise like a Horn-er something like that, and work was discontinued until the 24th of May, the weather and the mules permitting.
