Messrs. G. W. Muckle and J. H. Holmes returned on Monday evening to their homes in Blenheim, after spending ten days in the North Land, with which new country they were much impressed in many ways. Among the other points of interest they visited was Mr. Muckle's quarter-section of land in Murphy Township, awarded his father for service in the Fenian Raids. They found literally four or five feet more snow in the bush on the land than they would see two months earlier at their southwestern Ontario home, but they also viewed such a magnificent array of big pulpwood and other timber on the property as would surely gladden the heart of any people from older Ontario where practically all but the shade trees and orchard trees have departed these many years.

Mayor Hughes, of Kingston, has secured permission from the Ontario License Board and the Provincial Secretary for the handing over to the two Kingston Hospitals of the liquor hereafter confiscated in Kingston by the authorities. Previously, the police destroyed the captured whiskey by pouring it in the gutters, et cetera, some mean people emphasizing "et cetera" as the common way. Any "sw. good whiskey was supposed to be wasted. It might be a good idea to secure authority for giving the liquor confiscated in Timmins to the Hospital here. Against this suggestion, it may be argued that there is only one Hospital here, and a whole lot of confiscated liquor. But there are people here who would be quite ready to start another hospital in town if necessary. Chief Craft has been pouring gallons upon gallons of whiskey in the yard next the station, and now he has a little garden there, and no one need be surprised if some men visit that fire-watered garden in a month or so to swipe an onion or a beet to get a cheap drunk.

In its last issue The Claybelt, of Cochrane, says: "Mr. L. Boivin has started cutting in his sawmill in the north end of the town beyond Sixth Avenue, and the unprecedented demand for lumber keeps the saws humming at a great rate. Mr. Boivin expects to cut about a million feet this year."

For the cause of Greater Production, Whitney Township is allowing the use of land owned by the municipality for cultivation. This land includes certain unused road allowances. Applications are being received by Mr. Irvin Wilson, Chairman of the Council Committee handling the enterprise.

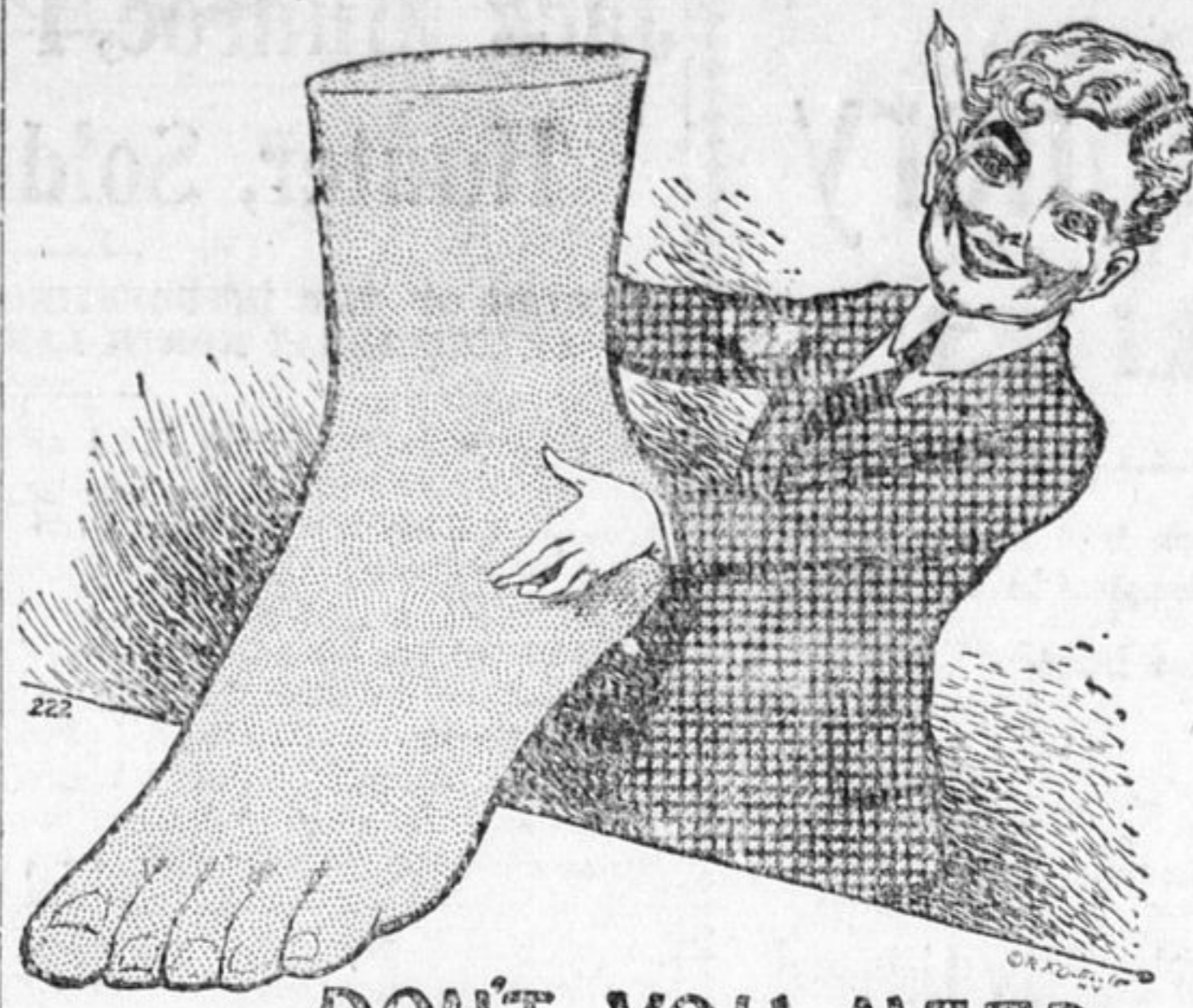
