Timmins News in Brief

Mr. A. R. Uttley, one of the Empire's soldiers who has done his "bit," is opening a high-class tailor shop in Schumacher.

Iroquois Falls continues to prosper and progress, one of the latest evidences of this being the commencement made on the macadamizing of the streets in that bustling new North Land town.

The Fire Brigade will likely have a run to the New Empire Theatre tonight and to-morrow night, for one of the pictures to be shown is "Blazing Love!" No doubt Manager Bardasseno has put on extra insurance for the two evenings.

Sincere sympathy will be extended by all in town to Mr. and Mrs. Bernard Durack in the death of their little baby girl on Monday. Margaret Adel Durack was only ill since Tuesday, and was nine months old at the time of death. Death was due to acute gastro-intestinal toxæmia.

Mr. Frank Uttley, of the McIntyre staff, returned on Wednesday last from Montreal where had gone to meet his brother, Private A. R. Uttley, who came back to the Camp with him. Pte. Uttley has been serving King and Country overseas, and is entitled to wear the proud badge, "For Services Rendered."

Mr. Charles Pierce is fixing up a fine new office for himself at the rear side of his store and with the entrance on Pine street. Mr. Pierce's present elevated office is too inconvenient for his growing business in the department store, lumber and other lines, and as he has faith in the immediate present and the great future of Timmins he is preparing for extensions of business in all lines by equipping a modern new office that will meet the needs.

Provincial Officer Ackroyd confiscated two cases of liquor last week. One of the cases was a case where a man was getting in a case while his wife had just gotten in a case in her name a day or two before. "There seem to be too many cases in this case," said D' Beeg Police, "of course if you want to take the case, well, then in that case I'll try to get a little case myself for the Magistrate to try the case." The man decided that, perhaps, he had enough cases for a little while, hence this case was confiscated.

The members of the D.Y.B. Club met at the home of Mrs. M. A. Ellis last evening with a large number present. Miss Muirhead presiding. During the business meeting the Secretary read a letter from Capt. Mary Plummer, of the Canadian Field Comforts Commission appealing for subscriptions to supply the boys at the front with special articles asked for by the different Units, such as baseball outfits, tommy cookers, trench candles, books, underclothing, musical instruments, etc., which entail considerable expenditure and which cannot be sent from Canada. After some debate it was moved and seconded that a cheque for \$50.00 be sent to Capt. Plummer at once. At the close of a very pleasant evening the meeting adjourned to meet at the home of Mrs. R. J. Jemmett next Monday, June 11th. Work taken in—15 pairs socks, 3 shirts. Work given out—Wool for 13 pairs of socks, 4 shirts.

Ciro Guirino, who was charged with assaulting John Nolan, night watchman at the Vipond, some months ago, was sentenced by Magistrate Jackson recently to eight months more in jail for the offence. He has already spent four months in jail awaiting trial. At first he was charged with attempted murder and so had to await the Spring Assizes, but recently in view of Mr. Nolan's complete recovery from the injuries received, and, perhaps, also the fact that the assault seemed to come from Guirino being inflamed with liquor at the time than from any other cause, the charge was reduced to the one of assault. This permitted the trial before the Magistrate, when the sentence of a year was made, the four months already spent in imprisonment to be counted as part of the sentence. Solicitor Cook made an able plea for Guirino, mentioning among other things that his client would enlist, if allowed to go. Guirino, however, was more alarmed at the prospect of enlisting than at the additional eight months' service, so his choice of interim was favored for the eight months' term of work for the state.

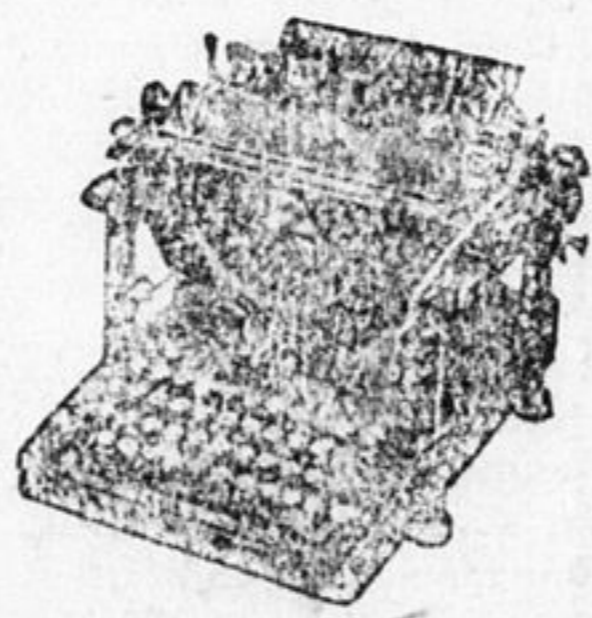

Pte. Jack Munroe left Monday for a brief visit to South Porcupine, leaving there in the evening to go by the National to Toronto where he will take further treatment for his injured arm.

The case of A. Gentile, accused of perjury in connection with his statements regarding the age of the girl whom he married, and whom it is now stated was 16 rather than 19 at the time of the ceremony, was before Magistrate Atkinson here on Thursday but was adjourned until the evening court at South Porcupine. The evidence of a number of witnesses was taken until there arose the question as to whether the oath was properly administered by the issuer of marriage licenses. Mr. Slaght, counsel for Mr. Gentile, held that as the proper formula had not been used there was no legal oath administered and hence there could be no charge of perjury. To consider this point, and look up authorities on the matter, the Magistrate adjourned the case until this week at the Timmins court.
