Timmins News in Brief

Mrs. Lowe, Sr., of Toronto, and daughter, are visiting the former's son, Mr. Geo. Lowe.

Mrs. Main, of Arnprior, who has been visiting her sister, Mrs. L. E. Dorway, returned home last week.

Mr. Bill White was a business visitor to Cochrane last week in his capacity as inspector for the Hydro Electric.

Mr. Frank Miller was in town last week on business. He reports a good crop of black flies on his farm at Connaught, but hopes for other more pleasing crops later.

Timmins L.O.L. No. 2552 are giving a picnic and dance for the pleasure of the brethren and their friends in the Oddfellows' Hall to-morrow (Thursday) evening. A pleasant evening is assured to all attending.

Those living up on "the Hill" deserve credit and commendation for their present successful efforts to improve the general appearance of their part of the town and to make homes out of the houses and lots. A number of fine lawns have been made this year and the effect is certainly pleasing and attractive.

The regular meeting of the Town Council will be held on Monday next. Owing to the regular meeting day falling on a holiday last week, the Council did not hold its regular session on the first Monday of the month, so there will possibly be a more than usually busy meeting next Monday.

Lieut. Jack Anderson, of the 159th Batt., well known throughout the North Land, has been reported as seriously wounded. This is the second time he has suffered wounds. He was with the Tough-Oakes mine at Kirkland Lake prior to his enlistment.

Provincial Officer Aekroyd confiscated quite a quantity of liquor coming in last week. Among the seizures made was a packing case falsely labelled and containing inside two kegs filled with the "Oh-Be-Joyful" stuff. Another package was melodiously marked as Maple Syrup, but in reality it held ten gallons of high-wines. The Provincial sighs at these evidences of duplicity. "Men were deceivers ever," he sadly remarks.

Word was received last week in Haileybury of the finding of the body of Mr. A. Lavoie, who was with Mr. O. M. Hennessy on the canoe trip that resulted in the death of both men. The body of Mr. Lavoie was found in the same rapids near Low Bush where Mr. Hennessy's body was recovered. Mr. Lavoie was a foreman for the Abitibi Power & Paper Co., of Iroquois Falls, for the past eighteen months. He had previously been in the pulpwood business at Haileybury. A wife and five children survive Mr. Lavoie. They live at White River on a farm owned by the deceased.

It is probable that the Miners' Union will hold a big day in Timmins on Labor Day. If present plans are accepted, there will be one of the finest programs of sports and other events ever given in the North Land. A meeting of the Union is called for Sunday afternoon next to consider the question. While, of course, nothing can be known definitely until after that meeting, it is understood that it is the intention to secure the co-operation of the Timmins Fire Brigade and other local bodies, and put on the biggest day of sports and pleasure ever held in the Porcupine. As noted in The Advance last week the Fire Chief has already volunteered full co-operation, so that if the Union follows up the matter the question of success will not be in much doubt.

Capt. T. A. G. McCarthy, Officer Commanding the Borden Battery, is visiting his brother at Haileybury. After the Battle of Vimy Ridge he was invalided to England on account of an attack of rheumatism, and since then he has been allowed a brief leave to visit home on this side of the water. To The Nugget last week Captain McCarthy spoke of some of the boys from the North Land who joined his unit. Among others he mentioned Ernest and Harry Holland. The former now holds the rank of Captain and the latter is a brigade quartermaster sergeant. "Doc" Dowsley has also obtained a commission, but is not at present with the Borden Battery. Capt. McCarthy speaks very highly of the Old Land, its people and institutions. They are now allowed three feeds of potatoes a week there as the new crop has been ready for some time.

Mr. A. Seeds, of Sandy Falls, last week was called to Cobalt owing to the illness of his step-mother. Before he could reach Cobalt, however, she had passed away.

The rain during the past few days has at least had the effect that it has saved the town the necessity of considering any system of street-oiling to keep down the sand called dust.

The T. & N. O. paint car came to town this week and between the rains things are being brushed up and beautified around the company's property.

The special features at the New Empire Theatre on Friday and Saturday were much enjoyed. McQuinn, "the man who sings to beat the band," did so to the satisfaction of the big crowds, while the attractive little McQuinn twins, in dancing and singing and other specialties, delighted all by their cleverness and skill. The songs, dances and other novelties made a pleasing change in the program.

All will regret to learn that Chief S. R. Craft is at present in the hospital at Haileybury undergoing treatment that may keep him there two or three weeks. Last week while returning from the River he ruptured a blood-vessel while coughing, and from this mishap, he was again taken ill at Cobalt where he went to spend the Dominion Day Celebration.

The Board of Trade is expected to meet in regular session on Thursday evening of this week,—the same being the Glorious Twelfth. The fact of the meeting night falling on the 12th may give some an excuse to neglect the meeting, but those interested in the welfare of the town and the progress of the community should be looking for excuses to attend and take a helpful part.

A formal card of the officially authorized type was received this week from Lance-Corporal W. M. Widdifield, dated "Somewhere on the East Coast." It gave the printed information as to arriving safely in good health and looking forward to a pleasant sea voyage, and concluded: "Kindly note the mailing address: Lance-Corporal Widdifield, W. The complaints against motorists in this district have considerably lessened recently, whether this be due to the people getting used to the autos for the season, or whether the promises of prosecution for infraction of the law were effective. In Cobalt, however, there have been very many complaints about reckless driving by motorists. No less than fourteen motorists were fined last week in the Silver City for exceeding the speed limit. And the Cobalt police say that this is only a beginning to the court cases,—or an end to the fast driving.

The electric power sub-station was put out of commission on Sunday afternoon by lightning, and the town was consequently in darkness for the evening. The damage was repaired, however, and lights and power were on tap as usual for Monday's workaday world. "It's like the old pioneer days, again," said the old-timers, as they viewed the unlighted streets Sunday evening, and noted the candles and other improvised forms of the "light of other days." To add to the inconvenience of the lights being off there was the occasional rain. The lack of good light made it impossible to sit inside and read, while the presence of the bad rain made it impossible to stay out and stand or walk with comfort. The incident, however, forms a new and happy excuse for many who were going to "write home" on Sunday evening, but who naturally were prevented by their lack of light.
