collection of poll tax and income tax,

especially from the foreigners, has

been a difficult, if not impossible task.

In one way or another the aliens have usually managed to evade the paying of any kind of taxes, but the authorities decided that this year the Town would not lose as usual. Accordingly, on Friday, the 10th,-the day on which the alien enemies have to report each month to the police,-the Tax Collector was installed at the police station. Later in the day he found so much business that Treasurer Mont gomery had to go over to assist in the taking in of the money, it was coming so fast. As soon as the aliens presented their cards the Tax Collector looked up their names on the roll, and called out whether they were liable for poll tax, income tax or other tax. "Poll tax, \$5" he would call out, "pay + here !" and he would thump the Treasurer's desk. And they paid. One hundred and ninetyfive paid poll tax, \$975 in all, looking like "found money" for the town. And \$1057.08 was collected on income taxes, more "found money." The Town was in over \$2030 by the day's good work. As one Councillor suggested this week, the Acting Chief, the Tax Collector and the Treasurer deserve a bonus for their able and strenuous work. They were at it all -day and had an evening session as well, about 600 alien enemies reporting here. Sudbury gave an instance recently, as published in The Advance, of how taxes may be collected from the alien enemies individually, but Timmins has shown the way to do it wholesale. Only one or two alien enemies raised any objection to paying their just taxes, and they did not make much of their objections, for Acting Chief Sally has the happy knack of radiating sunshine on such occasions and making alien enemies re alize that the Lord loveth a cheerful giver. There were, however, one or two interesting sidelights during the -day. One man when questioned with a view to finding out whether he he was not married. Acting Chief Sally looked at the fellow sharply. "Waren't you married a year ago?" with a woman about a year ago?' persisted the officer. "Dear Sir :- I am in receipt of instructions from Ottawa, stating that after arrival in England men qualified and employed on special work will receive pay at the undermentioned rates :- Sawyers, \$3.00 per day; millwrights, \$3.00 per day; engineers, \$2.25 per day; saw sharpeners, \$2.25 per day.
