Mr. R. McLean, of the Ostrorser staff, returned last week from a vacation trip to the south and east.

Mr. Geo. Clark, engineer of the Thompson-Krist, left last week for Council Bluff, Iowa, to join the U.S. army.

Provincial Officer Ackroyd left on Monday for Toronto to visit Mrs. Ackroyd who is in an hospital in the city where she has undergone an operation.

A Bridge Party will be held at the home of Mrs. W. H. Wilson, Timmins, on Thursday Evening, August 16th, under the auspices of the W.A. of St. Matthew's church. Games commence at 8 o'clock sharp. Admission, 50 cents. Evening's entertainment, refreshments included.

The many friends of Mr. and Mrs. F. J. Tozer will regret to hear of their expected early departure from Camp, but there will also be a compensating pleasure in the knowledge that the removal will mean merited promotion and improved prospects for Mr. Tozer, who is going to another important position with the Canadian Ingersoll-Rand Co. at Montreal.

There was an interesting exhibit put in the window of the Northern Canada Supply Company's store last week, in the form of a piece of German airship shot down in France some weeks ago. This souvenir of the war was sent to Mr. R. J. Jemmett by a friend with the 228th in France. This German airship was brought down by British machine gun fire on July 2nd, and the occupant of the airship was killed in the descent.

The sincerest sympathy of all the Camp will be extended to Mr. Clarence D. Evans, of South Porcupine, in the death of his wife and infant son on Saturday evening. Mrs. Evans had been in delicate health for some months past, and despite all the skill and attention of the attending physicians and nurses, mother and child passed away. The funeral on Monday was one of the largest ever seen in the Camp, and this was sincere indication of the respect and affection in which the late Mrs. Evans was held by all who knew her, and the deep sympathy felt by all for the bereaved husband.

T. N. O. Officer Swan last week arrested a young man in the railway's employ on a charge of stealing goods from some baggage. The collection of goods found hidden in the lad's room included a prayer book, a bottle of hair tonic, some handkerchiefs, a pocket knife and a pair or two of socks. There was nothing of any particular value stolen, the whole list of goods only totalling a value of a few dollars. It seemed to be a passing foolish twist, rather than any real criminality, that landed the boy in trouble. This was the view that Messrs. H. E. Montgomery and W. H. Wilson (South Porcupine), Justices of the Peace, took of the matter when the case came before them, and in view of the lad's youth, the fact that he made restitution and expressed sincere regret, he was allowed to go on suspended sentence.

Geo. Cocilo, an Austrian, hurried into the police station Sunday evening, begging with a thickish tongue for protection from a "little fellow" who was also an Austrian. But he did not hurry away again. Instead, Acting Chief Sally gave him the surest and safest protection for the evening. According to George's story he had gone to an Austrian house where a wedding was being celebrated, and there, he said, he was caressingly assaulted by the aforesaid "little fellow," whose name he gave as C. Obrigo. He also mentioned "booze" and many other things. Monday morning, however, Acting Chief Sally picked up Obrigo, and then the tune changed. Both Obrigo and Cocilo explained that no one but themselves had ever done anything wrong, and they even excused each other. Each man was so anxious to free everybody else from blame, even at the sacrifice of committing himself that the Chief nearly had to defend each of them as they came before Mr. H. E. Montgomery, J.P. The latter fined each man \$10 and costs for being drunk, and both delightedly agreed to the justice of this decision. Then Cocilo paid both fines forthwith, as his friend did not happen to have any money with him. It is a goodly thing for brethren to dwell together in love and unity.

Beans, 20 inches high, were well podded and promising. Other vegetables suggest good crops, and these flower and vegetable gardens have been so generally successful that Mrs. Cauley may well find pleasure, profit and pride in the result of her efforts.

Mr. Robt. Allen, who used to give all his time to Provincial Police duties, now spends most of his days trying to fix up a refractory Ford, volunteered to drive Magistrate Atkinson and License Inspector Blackwall to South Porcupine last week. They bravely took the risk. Everything went well all the way until the aforesaid Ford was passing under the overhead railway bridge a few hundreds yards from the starting point. Just as the car came out from under the bridge two big cars came down the hill at a good pace. To avoid running into the first car, Driver Allen turned out, only to find that he was going to hit the second car. He turned out still more and as the road is narrow he took the ditch. The car stayed right side up with care and a serious collision was avoided. At least that is Mr. Allen's version. Inspector Blackwall, on the other hand, suggests that during his connection with the Provincial Police force Mr. Allen got so into the habit of "running people in" that he could not resist the temptation when he had the Magistrate and Inspector in the car to "run them in"—to the ditch.
