Timmins News in Brief

Among those joining Lieut. Munro's Forestry Draft is Ken Deacon.

Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Elston and family returned from a vacation trip to North Bay and other points south.

Tuesday was the last regular weekly half holiday for the business places here this summer.

Another remand was given last week in the case against J. Salomon under the Ontario Temperance Act.

Mr. W. M. Sixt, of the McEaney Mine, is holidaying at Buffalo, Toronto and other points south.

Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Faithful are visiting at the old home of Mrs. Faithful in Corning, N. Y.

Misses Lillian and Lottie Noble left on Saturday for Toronto, after a few weeks' visit with their brother, Mr. E. S. Noble.

Miss Susie Bartlett, of Knight Bros. & McKinnon's, is leaving to take a position in the office of the Township of Tisdale.

Mr. H. Mueller has resigned from the Hollinger electrical staff, and has left for Winnipeg, Calgary, Vancouver and other western points.

Mr. J. O. Langlois has opened a Day and Night School for French and English, opposite King's Amusement Parlors, Pine street, Timmins.

Rev. J. Macdonald, of the Byrnes Presbyterian Church, Timmins, has been appointed District Chaplain of Temiskaming Masonic District No. 22.

Last week Constable Greer had Joseph Hudson before Mr. H. E. Montgomery, J.P., on a charge of being intoxicated in a public place. The fine was \$10 and costs, \$14 in all.

The fishing rights for Rib Lake near Temagami, have been secured by Denby Morgan, one of the North Land's old-timers and a returned soldier of special distinction.

The Tisdale Township Council has struck a tax rate of 33 mills for this year, and the Council is being congratulated by many on being able to keep the rate as low as that.

The Cobalt Firemen recently sent a cheque for \$240 to Mr. Robt. LeHeup, to be used for that patriotic work—the Children's Aid Society of Temiskaming.

Wm. Costello was summoned by Constable Greer to appear before Justice of the Peace Montgomery on Saturday evening, he did not so appear, but a friend came to inform the court that the accused was indisposed. The court then kindly adjourned until Monday when Costello appeared, pleaded guilty to the charge and was fined \$50 and costs.

Joe Turver, T. & N. O. news agent, was recently fined \$200 and costs in the Provincial Court for having liquor in his possession. Inspector Rowell took Joe off the train and prosecuted him with special vigor, for the brandy Joe was carrying was watered. "It is bad enough for fellows to be peddling booze at all," says Inspector Rowell, "but when they water the stuff, well, then it's just simply a clear bad case, for it proves that they are out to make money, not simply to succor thirsty souls in the dry North Land."

Much interest was excited on Wednesday afternoon last when a bush fire was seen burning across the river, but considerable distance away. The fire when first noticed seemed to have good headway and to be spreading rapidly. The wind was blowing away from the town, but the fire and smoke seemed at first to be drifting this way. Later in the afternoon, however, it was noted that the fire was completely under control, and it eventually died down and disappeared before evening. The fire was over sixteen miles from here in a direct line, but seemed much closer.

According to a letter received from one of the Battalion captains, it now seems almost certain that Sgt. Major Cecil Drew, brother of Messrs. Geo. and Wilbert Drew, of Timmins, lost his life leading his men into action at Hill 70. Sgt. Major Drew has been reported among the "missing" for several weeks, but it is feared now that he met death in No Man's Land gallantly doing his duty. For his brave and efficient work in previous engagements he was recommended for promotion, and the Battalion captain writes that on the day he was seen he was leading his men forward with his usual zeal and courage.

The schools re-open on Tuesday for the fall term.

Next Sunday being "Labor Sunday," Rev. J. Macdonald, of the Presbyterian church, will preach a sermon in the evening dealing especially with the Labor question.

An Italian, who had to be confined here some months ago owing to his demented condition, but who seemed to recover his senses for a time, again became insane last week, and had to be committed to the asylum for care. After a noisy musical evening at the cells on Thursday evening, he went down to North Bay on Friday with Constable Greer, the latter coming back alone.

Last week's Haileyburian says:—"On Saturday, while working on the high trestle which conveys the stripped logs from the Riordon Mill, Jack Dolan, fifteen-year-old son of Mr. C. Dolan, Haileybury, was pushed off his balance by one of the logs, and he fell to the dump below, a considerable distance. It was some time before he was discovered, and it is supposed that the logs continued to fall about him, probably causing further injury. When found he was in an unconscious condition, and was immediately rushed to the hospital. Examination showed one of his legs to be broken, and other injuries of a more or less serious nature, though not dangerous. The young lad will be laid up for several weeks before he will be able to be around again."

Sunday evening was a busy evening for the police. Acting Chief Sally arrested Terry Carleton on a charge of having liquor in a public place, namely, a rooming house. Mr. Carleton is out on \$200 bail. Constable Ravecroft of Schumacher, next hustled in an Austrian for being drunk in a public place. This man is also now out on bail. Then Chief Sally, Constable Greer and Provincial Officer Ackroyd gently guided into the cells two more Austrians who were driving in a buggy with a bottle of booze for joyous company. The Provincial just gathered in the bottle as one of the Austrians was kicking it out of the rig. All these cases will be heard before the Magistrate on Thursday, as will also the case against W. Ling for striking a waitress in one of the restaurants. Provincial Officer Ackroyd, who will soon be an expert at Chinese, is prosecuting in this Ling case.
