Mr. Ernest Bridger spent the week-end in Toronto.

Mr. Carl Mueller left yesterday for Toronto and other points south.

Mr. V. Woodbury left last week for a visit to Toronto and other points south.

Mr. J. S. McGuire left on a visit to Orangeville and other points last week.

Mr. Laprairie returned last week from his holiday in the south, Mrs. Laprairie remaining for a further visit.

Mr. and Mrs. Frank Evans left last week for a visit to Toronto and other southern points, including a trip through the famed Thousand Islands.

Mr. and Mrs. Harry Webb and son, Norman (Small Boy), left on Tuesday for a month's visit to Toronto and other points south.

The Women's Auxiliary of St. Matthew's parish, will meet to-morrow (Thursday) afternoon at 3 o'clock at the Rectory.

Mr. John Graboski left last week for Winnipeg, from which city it is his intention to go out to assist in the garnering in of the big harvest in the West.

In its last issue The Claybelt, of Cochrane, says:—"Mr. A. McD. Grossart, of Jacksonboro, passed through town on Tuesday for Timmins, taking 25 men with him to the upper portion of the Mattagami River. Mr. Grossart has just returned from a trip to Chicoutimi, where he has let contracts for 120 horses to come to the Mattagami limits for the coming winter, which will mean employment for about 400 men. The horses will be shipped between the 15th and 20th of September."

A special invitation is extended to all the women of Timmins to attend the meeting in the New Empire Theatre on Friday of this week, Sept. 7th, at 3 p.m. The delegates to the recent Food Convention in Toronto will give their report, and time will be allowed also for a general discussion of the different means of economy and thrift. Mrs. Parsons will deliver an address at the meeting, and those who have heard this gifted speaker will be pleased at this opportunity to hear her again.

Following complaints from Mattagami Heights that a man was acting there in a strange and disorderly way, Acting Chief Sally, in the absence of Provincial Officer Ackroyd, went down Friday evening to give the people of the neighboring townsite the benefit of police protection. Inside the Timmins limits, however, he met a man answering to the description of the disturber, and promptly placed him under arrest as the stranger was acting in a "drunk and disorderly" way. The man could not, or would not, give any account of himself, but the following morning before Mr. H. E. Montgomery, J.P., he gave his name as Nelson Perron, and satisfactorily explained himself as a former hotel-keeper at Sudbury, up here to buy a business. He did not remember going down to the river, or any of the subsequent proceedings, he said. He was fined \$25 and costs, which was paid at once.

Cochrane Town Council is calling for tenders for the use of the town water tank as an advertising place. No doubt some Montreal firms could appropriately pay for the privilege of advertising their gins, whiskeys and general boozes on that water tank. Dr. Moore returned last week much improved in health after an extended visit south. Mrs. Moore and son also returned on Monday of this week.

"The Masque of Life," presented at the New Empire Friday and Saturday was a picture of interest and originality, with many spectacular scenes that held the audience.

Pte. Victor Woods, well-known as a North Land prospector, has been reported from Ottawa as admitted to First South African General Hospital, Abbeville, with gunshot wound in left arm.

Constable Greer arrested two men Monday evening for being drunk, and early Tuesday morning Provincial Officer Ackroyd steered in three more, making a full house. It will likely take \$10 and costs to open each Jack pot.

At Haileybury last week Dr. J. A. H. Joyal and Miss Florestine Laframboise were united in marriage by the groom's brother, Rev. Fr. J. O. Joyal. Among those present at the wedding was Rev. Canon Joyal, uncle of the groom. After a honeymoon in the West, Dr. and Mrs. Joyal will take up residence in Haileybury.

Those who were down at the river last Wednesday night viewed one of the most interesting sights seen on that body of water for some time. It was the Steamer Agnes and a big motor boat towing an immense boom of logs. This boom was one of the biggest ever brought down the river and it about reached the power capacity of the two boats to drag it along. The logs came from about six miles up the river.

Rev. Kenneth W. Barton, B.A., one of the most gifted of violinists, will give a program in the Presbyterian Church here on Thursday evening, September 20th. The program will include violin selections, and a bright lecture, "The Message of the Violin." Rev. Mr. Barton is making a tour of the North Land and music lovers are speaking with the greatest enthusiasm and appreciation of his work as a violinist.

As a result, a Schumacher Austrian was arrested on the charge of selling the men liquor, and is now out on \$200 bail on the charge. He will receive trial this week before Magistrate Atkinson.

Rizzato, one of the pioneer business men of the Porcupine, having been in Golden City in its golden days and later moving to Timmins when Porcupine ceased to be a centre, has sold his Ideal Pool Room and Rooming House to Mr. Geo. Demagne, now proprietor of the Club Saloon, corner of Third Avenue. "Tony," who has been in indifferent health for some months past, intends to go to his sister's in Pennsylvania for care and rest.

Rt. Rev. Bishop Latulippe, who is at present at the Hotel Dieu Hospital, Montreal, is much improved in health and will be able to return to Haileybury in the course of the next two or three weeks, according to word received at Haileybury last week. The Bishop has been seriously ill for the past three or four months and there will be general pleasure at the news that he is now convalescent and on the way to complete recovery.
