IROQUOIS FALLS BEAT TIMMINS

In the afternoon, the clerk of the weather permitting, the Goldminers opposed a combined Iroquois Falls team, before a large attendance of enthusiastic spectators, including a good mustering of the ladies. From all appearances the boys from the Gold Camp were out to revenge the Dominion Day defeat, that is provided the Papermakers agreed. The lineup was as follows:—

In the first innings Gratton had an easy passage taking third and home on two pass balls after a hit for a single. In the third innings the Timmins boys made a rally and scored through Perrault, Noln, and Pierce after Horsburgh had gotten McAndrews out coming in to the home plate.

The papermen tied the score in the fourth innings through Buncke and Obert, although the latter got on base rather luckily owing to Catcher Burns failing to hold the ball after the third strike. At this juncture had not the Timmins team's anxiety to get in front got the better of their common sense they might have taken the lead, but Nolan ran Perrault off third base with two down and Catcher Horsburgh got him out at home.
