Timmins News in Brief

Cochrane is holding its Fall Fair on September 27th and 28th.

Lieut. Jack Munroe was a visitor to the Camp last week for a day or two.

BORN—At Haileybury, on Wednesday, September 5th, 1917, to Mr. and Mrs. Earle Acton,—a daughter.

Mr. Thos. Dowler, who resigned as principal of the public school here in June last, is now principal of the public school at Espanola, Ont.

Mr. Geo. L. Clark, formerly at the Thompson-Krist Mine, is now with Company A, First Iowa Engineers, Camp Dodge, Des Moines, Iowa, U.S.A.

According to the press reports nearly four hundreds applications have now been received from Returned Soldiers for farm lands in the North, on the Ontario Government's plan of assistance to soldiers settlers.

The dance given in the Masonic Hall on Monday evening by some of the young men of the Camp proved a pleasant and enjoyable event, and those present spent a delightful evening.

Mr. J. Perrault, who has for several months been on the staff of the Marshall-Ecclestone, Ltd., left on Friday for New Liskeard to go in with the Taylor Hardware Co., with which concern he was formerly connected. During his stay in the Camp he made many friends by his unfailing courtesy and business efficiency, and while regretting his removal from Timmins these many friends join in wishing him the best in New Liskeard.

Lieut. Jack Munroe addressed the Cobalt Soldiers' Wives Club on Friday afternoon last, and also on behalf of the Club presented a small remembrance to Baby James—the only war baby of the club. Lieut. Munroe spoke chiefly on Red Cross work, but gave also many interesting sketches of incidents in the lives of the soldiers overseas. The members of the Club were enthusiastic in expressing their appreciation of the address of Lieut. Munroe.

The regular meeting of the Board of Trade will be held in the Old Empire Theatre to-morrow (Thursday) evening, and a large attendance is specially requested. The last few meetings of the Board have not been well attended, and as there is a large amount of useful work for the organization if the citizens will only take a part and interest, it is trusted that this week the attendance will be large and enthusiastic.

Owing to the fact that the accommodation in classes below the Third Book is being overcrowded at the Public School here the Timmins School Board has been compelled to announce that hereafter pupils under the grade of Third Book can not be admitted to the school here unless their parents or guardians are supporters of Timmins Public School. Outside pupils of the Third Book or higher grades will, however, continue to be admitted on payment of the following fees:—Pupils below Entrance class, \$1.00 per month; Pupils above Entrance, \$2.00 per month.

SHOWING THE INSTINCT OF DUCK HUNTERS

Two young men of the town went out duck hunting the other day, and they gave evidence of an almost uncanny appreciation of the habits and thoughts of ducks. It is a well-known fact that ducks learn to know and fear the sight of a gun. Well, one of the men seemed to know this for he left his gun down on the dock at John Power's landing. By leaving the gun behind thus at the start-off of the trip all danger was removed of the ducks seeing that gun and being frightened away out of gunshot. Well, the duck-hunters with only one gun between them started up the river. The one gun constituted no danger, for both men could lie down on it and hide it if they saw any ducks looking their way. At the first landing the second man seemed to fear that the ducks might be equally afraid of the supply of shells if they saw them from a distance, so he left the shells on the shore—(where shells usually are). Constable Greer had Wm. Wilomas before Mr. H. E. Montgomery, Justice of the Peace, on Saturday evening on a charge of being drunk. Wilomas was fined \$10 and costs.

Mr. Art King, who until some months ago was driver of the Timmins Fire team, is now again holding his former position at Haileybury as the driver in the Fire Department there.

The Haileyburian says:—"Mrs. Douglas Briden has received word that her husband, Aviator Briden, is on his way to Canada, and he will probably be in Haileybury in the course of a week or two." At the time of his enlistment he was employed at the Dome mines.

In a letter to the Camp this week, Lance-Corporal W. M. Widdifield reports that he is now in France with the "good old bunch" and someones. He says that he has received no letters recently from any here and suggests that "some of the corrugated old bums get busy with a pen right away."

As will be noted by the announcement elsewhere in this issue Mr. Neil Ryan has taken over the gent's furnishings business formerly conducted under the firm name of Murtagh and Ryan. Mr. Ryan is a popular young business man, with a wide experience in his lines, and with up-to-date and progressive ideas, and no doubt will hold the connection established by the firm, as well as adding to the patronage of the business at 47 Pine street.

According to the report of a recent meeting of the Haileybury Board of Trade, it is now considered unlikely that the Riordan Pulp and Paper Company will build a big sulphide plant in Haileybury, as the citizens there so confidently hoped and so earnestly desired some months back. The general policy of the Riordan Company is now said to be against the entering of big new projects until the conditions caused by the war are in a measure remedied or steadied down.

Mr. Murtagh, who was the senior partner in the firm of Murtagh and Ryan, which business was taken over last week by Mr. Ryan, is now visiting the great West where he may locate if he sees a favorable opening. Mr. Murtagh has been connected with the business interests of the North Land for several years, and his friends here would regret his removal, though all would wish him well in any new enterprise. Mrs. Murtagh and family are remaining here until Mr. Murtagh definitely decides on his plans and location.

Visitors coming from the West report work at Kapuskasing Camps progressing at a gratifying rate. Gradually an important North Land settlement of homes is growing up there. The "white" settlers there are of the finest type, being chiefly Returned Soldiers and members of the Queen's Own, of Toronto. Part of the work of building roads, houses, etc., was done by the labor of alien enemies interned at the Kapuskasing Camp, and it is especially gratifying to think that the labor of these aliens will in the end add to the comfort and convenience of the loyal men gathered at Kapuskasing as guards and as Returned Soldiers taking up land there under the generous provisions of the Ontario Government legislation.

Last year the town was singularly free from all sorts of fevers and contagious diseases. Indeed Timmins has made a regular record in this respect as a mining camp—a record, perhaps, equalled by no other camp its size. The authorities are as anxious as the people to keep it so. Accordingly, this week, the Board of Health simply as a precaution issued notices requesting the people to boil all water used for domestic purposes. The object of this request is to PREVENT the probability of diseases. This is the time of year when water is liable to contain the germs that cause trouble, and boiling the water will minimize any danger. Householders are accordingly requested to boil the water.
