Mr. Maclean's many friends in the Camp extend the sincerest congratulations and good wishes.

He was one of the early pioneers of Cobalt and the Porcupine and was as widely known and as much esteemed as any of the famous old-timers. He had both ability and luck in the mining game, but his generous disposition prevented him entering the millionaire class. He was in Winnipeg when war broke out, and at once joined the "Little Black Devils," one of the famous battalions from Canada. They gained their name from the fury with which they advanced, and their inevitable threat to the Boches, "We'll give you Hell." "Foghorn" enlisted as a private but is now a Major in the Battalion. He also won the Distinguished Service Order. All of which is no more than his friends and acquaintances would expect from him. It is expected that he will visit the Porcupine in the near future.
