THE PROBLEM OF IMMIGRATION

There are many important questions touched upon in the announcement of the policy of the new Union Government, but, apart from the pressing problems relating to the immediate conduct of the war, there are no more vital subjects than those of immigration and colonization. On the wisdom and success of the immigration and colonization policies depend in large measure the future of the land in citizenship, prosperity and progress.

It is a fact that in the past Canada has dealt with immigration and colonization in much the same spirit as voiced by the McGill College students one time in Montreal when they rushed along the streets in an aimless, haphazard manner singing lustily, "We don't know where we're going, but we're on the way." In the past, Canada's effort to secure immigration and colonization has followed a simi-

lar plan without apparent purpose. The cry has been, "the country must develop," but no defined purpose has been kept in view. It has been forgotten apparently that population alone does not mean development in any better sense, else China would be one of the greatest nations in the world. It has also been forgotten that to give away the land and resources of the country to others is far from "developing" Canada in a proper sense. It is easy to be carried away with the popular notion that somehow numbers make a nation great, but a little consideration will show that genuine development can only be measured by the standard of living, the comfort, the education, the health, and the morality of the people in general. The problem for Canada is not to find ways and means for getting a quantity of people here, but to devise plans for getting the right kind of people,—the people who will be the right kind of citizens while they are here, and who will be HERE FOR GOOD in a double way.

In the past, Governments made occasional desperate spurts at securing immigration and colonization. There seemed to be no true policy behind these rushes, unless it were, as it seemed, to make this land great,—like China,—in the number of its people. Just before the war the big cities were crowded with unemployed,—and this was but the result of what was termed "development." Aliens coming here may have bettered their own conditions, but too often they lowered the living standards and the comforts of those already here. Before the war too many in Canada were sending money to foreign lands, and to-day there are too many waiting for the war to end to return to what they still term "home." Surely, policies that bear these fruits in abundance can not be classed as for the advantage of Canada.

What is needed is a policy with a purpose,—a policy that will bring citizens, not sojourners, to Canada; that will develop the resources of this country, not exploit them; that will maintain Canadian and British ideals and high standard of living; that will see to it that Canada is a land of comfort and of general opportunity for happiness, whether the population be small or large. In the meantime, the Government need not unduly hurry. The resources of Canada will not run away while the policy is being formulated. The Union Government should know of a surety where we are going before they start us on our way.

TENDERS FOR PULPWOOD LIMIT

Tenders will be received by the undersigned up to and including the seventeenth day of December next for the right to cut pulpwood and pine timber on a certain area situated in the vicinity of the Kapuskasing River in the Districts of Timiskaming and Algoma.

Tenderers are to offer a flat rate per cord for all classes of pulpwood, whether spruce or other woods. The successful tenderer shall be required to pay for the Red and White Pine on the limit a flat rate of \$10 per thousand feet board measure.

The successful tenderer shall also be required to erect a mill or mills on or near the territory, and to manufacture the wood into pulp and paper in the Province of Ontario, in accordance with the terms and conditions of sale which can be had on application to the Department.

Parties making tender will be required to deposit with their tender a marked cheque payable to the Honourable the Treasurer of the Province of Ontario, for Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00), which amount will be forfeited in the event of their not entering into agreement to carry out conditions, etc. The said Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) will be held by the Department until such time as the terms and conditions of the agreement to be entered into have been complied with and the said mills erected, equipped and in operation. The said sum may then be applied in such amounts and at such times as the Minister of Lands, Forests and Mines may direct in payment of accounts for dues or any other obligation due the Crown until the whole sum has been applied. The highest or any tender not necessarily accepted.
