PLATFORM OF THE UNION GOVERNMENT

Condensed Review of the Programme Officially Outlined.

Last week Hon. Sir Robt. L. Borden, Premier of the newly-formed Union Government, outlined the policy to be vigorously prosecuted by the Union Government. In view of the fact that the approaching election will necessarily resolve itself into a contest between those supporting the Union Government and those opposed to the Union Government the following review of the policy of the new Government as outlined by the Premier will be of general interest:—

The Union Government pledges it-

self—

Provide necessary reinforcements

for the soldiers overseas, the Military Service Act (Conscription) to be used fully and fairly to this end.

The income taxation is to be increased for revenue purposes.

Increased and adequate taxation of war profits.

Co-operative management of all the railway systems in Canada.

Shipbuilding in Canada is to be encouraged by the Government.

National steamship lines are to be established on both the oceans and the Great Lakes.

Reduction of expenditure, avoidance of waste and encouragement of thrift.

Vigorous immigration and colonization with increased agricultural production.

Civil Service reform to be extended to the outside service, and all appointments to public service to be by merit alone.

The franchise to be extended to women in general.

Effective care of and assistance to returned and demobilized soldiers.

Adequate pensions to all soldiers.

Effective measures to prevent excessive profits.

Prevention of combinations for the increase of prices.

Encouragement of co-operation among farmers to diminish the cost of production and marketing, and the consequent reduction of costs of living to consumer.

Development and conservation of the resources of the Dominion.

Adequate consideration of the needs of the working people, so as to assure to them, through bettered conditions of employment, etc., suitable standards of living.

Improved understanding between the Eastern and Western provinces as to the problems and conditions that affect East and West separately or together.

Two permanent committees of the Cabinet to be formed. One of these Committees is to devote all its attention to the vigorous prosecution of the war, and the other is to study conditions that will face this country after the war, and to find remedies for any evils that may exist, prevention for threatening conditions, and means and methods to make the best and the most of all opportunities that may arise for Canada and the Empire when the war is won.

At a recent meeting in North Bay the Independent Labor Party practically decided to run a Labor candidate in Nipissing in the approaching election.


NEW SERIAL STARTING AT THE NEW EMPIRE


