Timmins News in Brief

Mr. J. Langskill and daughter, of Toronto, visited the Camp last week.

Mr. Robt. Rice, mining engineer, is visiting the Camp this week and finds much of interest and promise as usual in the Porcupine.

During the month of September over twenty tons of asbestos were shipped from the Slade-Forbes property in Deloro.

Mr. Wilfrid Loughrin has returned to Camp after a stay at Port Arthur and other points. While away he joined the colors, but failed to qualify for continued service owing to the stringent physical requirements.

About sixty went before the Medical Board at Haileybury, over half of them also applying for exemption. Those who did not report will have to go to the nearest mobilization centre to be examined by a Medical Board before November 10th.

The D. Y. B. Club had a very pleasing at their meeting on Monday at the Goldfields. The work taken in was 12 pair socks, 1 shirt. Work given out:—wool for 18 pairs socks and 5 shirts. Next meeting at the home of Mrs. M. A. Ellis on Monday evening, October 29th.

Among the new firms starting in the Porcupine is the business of Newton & Fitzpatrick, Pulp Dealers, with head office at Timmins. The members of the firm are L. S. Newton and J. Fitzpatrick, and they will be general dealers and contractors in pulp, pulp-wood, etc.

A girl in Sandusky, Ohio, has been boasting that she has kissed no less than 675 brave soldiers good-bye. "That's nothing," says a Timmins young lady, "why I must have kissed one single brave Canadian soldier good-bye at least 675 times. And of course there were others."

According to the statement by Mr. F. H. Anson, President of the Abitibi Power & Paper Co., who is now at Iroquois Falls inspecting the plant, the output of the company has been doubled as a result of the completion of the new pulp mill. Instead of 65 tons a day, the output is now 130 tons per day, and the capacity for ground wood pulp is increased to 300 tons per day. Mr. Anson adds that the Company is now selling to its full capacity and can continue to do so for some time yet.

While attempting to fix a belt at the Hollinger last week, Mr. Albert Cosgrove was caught in the belt and had his arm badly broken. He was taken to the hospital where he is making satisfactory recovery. The arm was so badly crushed and broken that it is necessary to put it in a plaster cast, but the injured man was fortunate apparently to escape with no more serious injuries. Just how the accident occurred is not clear, the young man's last memory being of starting to adjust the belt. It is thought that he was caught up and carried along the belt, for when found he was several yards away from where he had been when adjusting the belt.

There was a meeting of the Win-the-War Conservatives held in the Council Chambers on Friday evening for the purpose of selecting delegates for the Convention this week in Cobalt. About twenty names were suggested as delegates who were able to attend the Convention, and the selection of the balance of the fifty-one delegates that Timmins is entitled to was left to the judgment of the President and the Secretary. Among the other business at the meeting was the passing of a hearty vote of thanks to Capt. Tom Magladersy for the recent able and inspiring address given here and for the interest and effort he has shown along the lines of "Win-the-War."

In the course of a report of a recent meeting of the Cochrane Town Council the Cochrane papers publish a letter from Mr. James Stewart, secretary of the Cochrane Fire Department. In this letter to the Council Mr. Stewart says, among other things:—"Timmins has a modern Fire Department, including team, engine, hose wagon, ladder truck and three or four paid firemen. A modern fire alarm system was also recently completed in Timmins, which includes an individual alarm in the home of every fireman." Mr. Stewart writes thus in the hope of influencing Cochrane Council to better its fire-fighting appliances, but people in Timmins will only hope that all other fire chiefs and those interested in fire protection matters will keep on advertising Timmins' up-to-date means and methods until at the final grand tasteeven the Underwriters may hear the joyful tidings and reduce the fire insurance rates a little as a consequence.
