DECEMBER 17 WILL BE ELECTION DAY

Nominations for Dominion Election to be on November 19th.

According to despatches from Ottawa this week it has been decided to hold the Dominion Elections on December 19th. The writs calling for the election are to be issued in time for the nominations to take place on November 19th. The voting of the soldiers overseas will likely commence by November 22nd, and the overseas polling will close on December 17th, the day for voting in Canada. Practically all arrangements have been

completed for both the home and overseas voting, and the battle will be over before the Christmas holiday season. In some constituencies, however, it may be that definite results will not be known until the polling returns come from overseas. This latter may be late in January.

Pleasing progress is being made in the selection of candidates in Ontario and the West in support of the Union Government. In Western Canada, except in British Columbia, the elimination of surplus candidates in favor of Union Government and Conscription is being successfully carried out. In the Western Provinces the parties adopted a division on the same basis as the representation in the last parliament. In Ontario there were 72 Conservatives and 14 Liberals in the last House, and the Liberals are asking a larger percentage than this of the candidates. The general opinion will be that they should have at least an approach to what they ask. On account of the fact that both parties in some cases have had candidates in the field for a year, two years and even more, there is some difficulty in some ridings, especially where both candidates are in favor of Conscription and Union Government. Ottawa despatches claim that there will not be by any means a "solid Quebec" against the Union Government, the latter expecting at least 15 seats to be won for them in the election. A number of acclamations are expected for Union Government candidates in Ontario.

SEND IN NUMBERS OF SOLDIERS AT FRONT

Red Cross Wants Number, Battalion, Etc., for Addressing Parcels.

The Timmins Red Cross has now about 300 Christmas Stockings ready for the soldiers overseas from this town. The Society, however, while having the names of practically all the men overseas from this Camp are anxious to secure the regimental numbers, battalions, etc., for accurate addressing. Without a soldier's number and battalion on the address it is impossible sometimes to assure delivery. Those who know the number of any soldiers overseas from this Camp will be doing a favor to all concerned if they will send the addresses to the Red Cross here. This should be done at once, as it is intended to pack the Stockings for shipment here on Friday.

The three hundred Stockings now ready for the Timmins lads overseas look especially attractive. Inside they are no less attractive. The contents of these Stockings necessarily vary with the tastes of the men, when these tastes are known, but the contents of

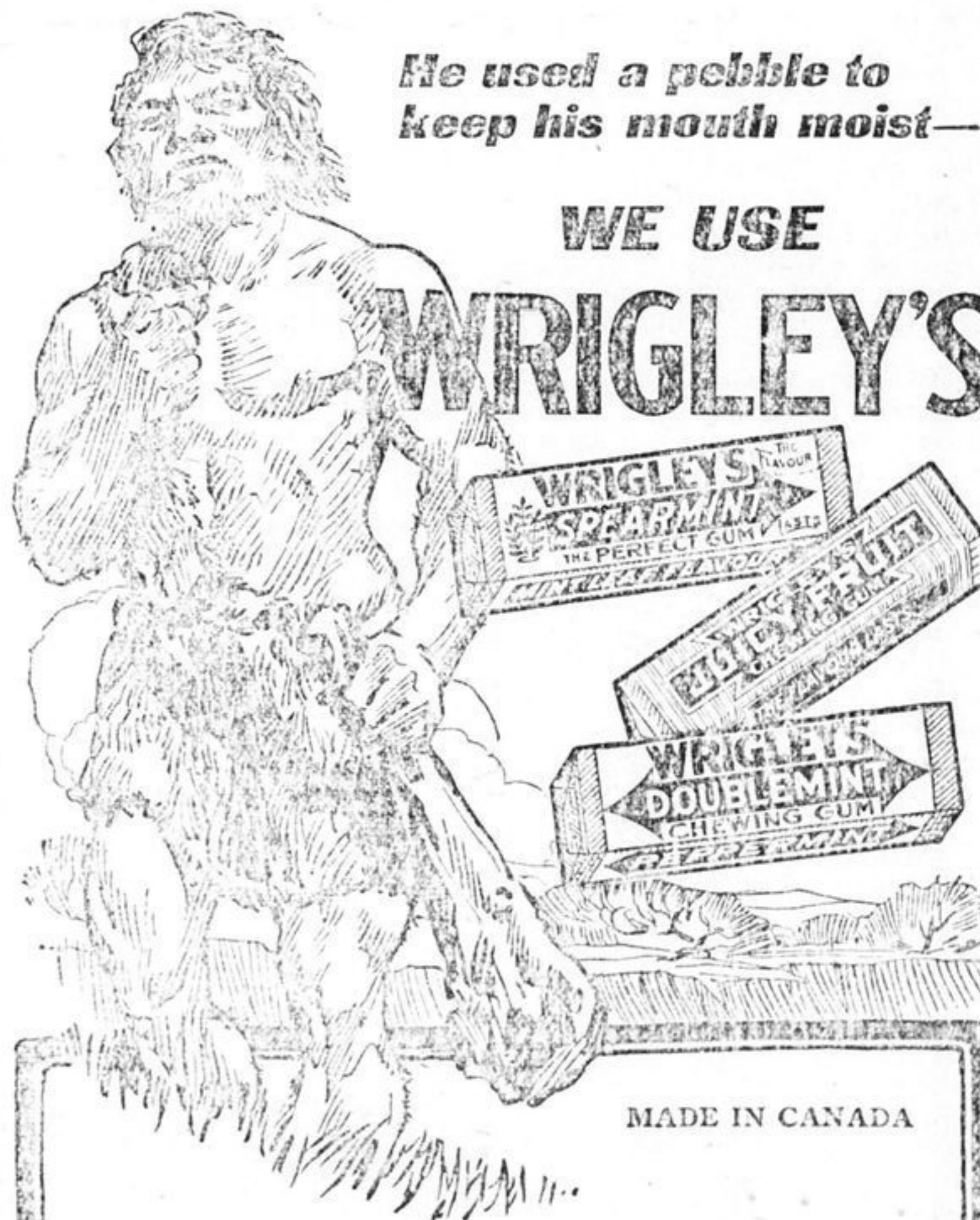
most include:—handkerchiefs, socks, chocolates, nippers, playing cards, cigarettes, tobacco, soap, washcloths, etc. The average value of each Stocking is over \$2.00, so the ladies must be complimented on the energy and effective work thus shown in remembering the men overseas. Right away,

at once, now, others should help by furnishing wherever possible as complete addresses as can be given of any soldiers known to be overseas from this Camp, particular effort being made to furnish regimental number, etc., so as to assure the safe and sure passage of the Christmas Stockings.
