NEWRAY RATIFIES DEAL WITH CROWN

Shareholders Practically Unanimous. Dominion Reduction Also in Deal.

A special shareholders' meeting of the Newray Mines, Limited, was held on Thursday last in Toronto, and as suggested by The Advance the shareholders were practically unanimous in ratifying the deal with the Crown Reserve Mining Co., and authorizing the increase in capital from 1,500,000 to 3,000,000 shares per value \$1.00. The Crown Reserve Mining Co. contracts to develop the mine with an ample monthly expenditure, taking over stock to the amount of 1,800,000 shares at an average price of 45 cents a share. Dr. B. J. Bixby, president of the Newray, occupied the chair at the meeting, and approximately 900,000 shares of the company were represented in the vote, which was practically unanimous for the deal. The Dominion Reduction Company, of Cobalt, is now also in the deal, having taken over half of the Crown Reserve interest and working jointly with the Crown Reserve in the matter. It is understood that at the time the deal was put through with the directors there were three prospective purchasers of a controlling interest in the Newray, the Dominion Reduction Co. being one of the three. The matter was adjusted by an agreement for a joint interest by the Crown Reserve and Dominion Reduction Companies. Already aggressive development work is under way at the Newray and important advances may be expected in the near future.

HAILEYBURY SOLDIER HOME FROM GERMAN PRISON CAMP.

The Haileyburian last week says:—"After a long incarceration in the prison camps of Germany, and a further stay of many months in Switzerland, Pte. H. O. Lamb returned to his family here on Sunday's 'National'."

"Pte. Lamb enlisted here in the early stages of the war, and in the first battle of Ypres, April 23rd., 1915, was taken prisoner. He spent nearly a year and a half at Gottingen prison camp in Germany, from which place, on account of ill health, he was sent to Switzerland and after a year there was repatriated returning to England and thence to Canada.

"Pte. Lamb shows the effects of his long stay in the prison camps of the enemy, but it is expected that the good old Canadian air and New Ontario food will soon restore him to his original health and vigor. He has done his bit for his home and country, and has set an example that should be an inspiration to those young men who have not yet gone forth to strike a blow for freedom.

ANOTHER BUSY DAY AT POLICE COURT

Large Number of Cases Dealt With by Magistrate Atkinson.

Thursday was another busy day for the police court here. Constable Greer supplied the "Booze" cases, having charges against two men for selling. A young man named Bissonette was accused of selling liquor to the defendant in the other case, but the charge was dismissed. The evidence was inconclusive and conflicting and in the end simmered down to one man's word against another. Toyean, employed in one of the local lumber industries, was fined \$300 and costs, or the usual term in jail, for selling liquor to a lad of about 16 years of age. Toyean's story was that he bought the liquor from Bissonette. His employer made a plea for leniency towards Toyean, as he was an industrious and hard-working man with a family to support, but as the liquor had been given to a minor the Magistrate was not inclined to leniency. "It is bad enough to be selling liquor to men around here," said Magistrate Atkinson, "but I can show no sympathy to a man who sells the stuff to lads."

Provincial Officer Aekroyd had the two famous fighting Austrian ladies before the court. Mary Klemp was charged with assaulting the other Austrian Amazon was charged with assaulting Mary. The evidence was loud, strong, foreign and fierce on both sides, and the Magistrate dismissed both cases, advising the women to be good and to behave. A theft charge laid by the Provincial Officer was also dismissed the evidence being insufficient to sustain the charge. Another interesting case brought forward by the Provincial was a number of assault charges against a number of Russians, who had gotten in a dispute in a rooming house. The stories told by complainant and the different parties accused varied greatly, and Magistrate Atkinson dismissed the case.

Schumacher Red Cross Society

The regular business meeting of the Schumacher Red Cross Society was held November 1st., Mrs. Richardson presiding.

After roll call, minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved. The Treasurer's Report, which was also accepted, gave the month's expenditures as \$348.93, leaving a balance of hand of \$683.60.

A full report of the year's work was read, giving particulars of the money received, goods shipped and material on hand, etc., which will be sent to Toronto; also a full report to be published as soon as the books, which are being audited, are returned. This being the end of the fiscal year
