Timmins News in Brief

Many a key to success is allowed to rust in the lock.

Nomination and election of officers will be held at the local L.O.L. next Monday evening, November 26th.

Last week's Haileyburian says:— "Miss Olive Berry, of South Porcupine, is visiting her mother, Mrs. A. Berry, who has been seriously ill, but is now somewhat improved.

According to word received at So. Porcupine, Wilfred Brown, formerly of the Dome Mines staff and brother of L. W. Brown, is reported as being wounded.

"Intolerance" at the New Empire Theatre last Thursday drew crowded houses. The general opinion was that it was the most spectacular production seen here with the exception of "The Birth of a Nation," though there were differing views as to its interest and effectiveness. However, "Intolerance" is recognized as one of the most striking of modern-day photo plays, and Timmins was the first Far North town to see it, for with their usual enterprise the management of the New Empire had secured it for appearance here even before it was shown in Cobalt.

Several men were taken off the trains down the line from Cochrane to Cobalt during the past few days for not having reported for service or applied for exemption, as required by law. As a consequence these men are serving in the army several weeks before they otherwise would be called, and in addition some will have other penalties to bear for breach of the laws.

On a couple of occasions The Advance has made the mistake of referring to the new Baptist pastor as Rev. Ivan F. Cruickshanks. It should have been "Rev. Ian F. Cruickshanks." "Ian" is the Gaelic equivalent for "John," and it is perhaps, not amiss to recall the mistake, as "Ian," associated through its English equivalent with "John the Evangelist" is a more apt name for the new preacher than the "Ivan" associated, perhaps, with the Russian Czar, "Ivan the Terrible." There is none of the "Terrible" about the new Baptist pastor, but undoubtedly much of the "Evangelist," as the services in the Oddfellows Hall each Sunday evening prove.

The members of the D.Y.E. Club met at the home of Mrs. M. A. Ellis on Monday evening, November 19th, with a large attendance, Miss Muirhead presiding. Two new members were enrolled in the persons of Misses Lynett and Hoggarth. After the usual work of the Club had been taken up, Mrs. Ellis served lunch and the meeting adjourned to meet next week at the home of Mrs. Ellis. As this meeting will end the Second year of the organization of the Club, the meeting will take the form of a re-election of officers and all members are therefore requested to make a special effort to be present at this meeting. Work taken in:—8 pairs socks, 3 shirts. Work given out:—Wool for 11 pairs socks, 2 shirts.

Among those at the Nomination meeting here on Monday from Iroquois Falls were S. G. McCoubrey, Mayor, and Mr. Hodgins, Town Clerk. When Mayor McCoubrey was complimented on the fine showing made by his town in the matter of exemptions and reports for service under the Military Service Act, his reply was that he was naturally proud of Iroquois Falls from the opening of the war. Over 800 men in the employ of the Abitibi Power & Paper Co.,—in bush and mill,—have enlisted in the service of King and Country in the past three years. In one Company alone there were no less than 22 skilled men of the A. P. & P. Co. joined up during a recruiting tour of this district. In giving and working for patriotic causes, Iroquois Falls has always evidenced the same pleasing loyalty.

Rev. Ian F. Cruickshanks last week received the very acceptable and kindly offer of the gift of an organ to the new Baptist Church here. The generous donor is a Toronto lady.

"The Barrier," the special at the New Empire Theatre on Saturday was generally agreed to be one of the best moving picture reels shown here for some time. The matinee on Saturday afternoon brought such glowing reports of this picture play by Rex Beech that there was not room enough in the big theatre to accommodate the crowd that turned out in the evening.

Two lads went through the ice on Gillies Lake on Saturday afternoon, but were rescued by men who happened to be in the vicinity. By pushing a boat along the ice, the men were able to safely reach the boys with a rope. The lads are both recovered from the danger of their stay in the icy water, but one of them, Joe Peters, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. Peters, is suffering still from the effects to his hands, where he injured the nails in his repeated and determined efforts to save himself by getting a grip on the ice. The ice, though more than two inches thick, had been "honey-combed" by the warm sun of the previous few days, thus making possible the break through that put the lads in danger.

An Austrian with a college education is not the usual type here, but there was such an Austrian recently at the Dome Mines. He was accused, however, by loyal people of using the respect entertained for his superior education and advantages to instil sedition and other evil things in to the minds of his fellow countrymen. Several recent reports suggest that he had been preaching disloyalty and treachery, and last week he overstepped the mark and now will cause no more trouble during the war. He discovered that two of his countrymen had promised to purchase \$1000 worth of Victory Bonds, and going to them he talked to such effect that they reduced the amount to \$100. In the conversation, however, he necessarily used such treasonable and false arguments that his arrest followed, with the penalty to come after of internment.
