### ABITIBI OFFICE WIN THE FIRST GAME OF SEASON.

The Iroquois Falls Basketball was inaugurated at the Town Hall on Monday night last when the Main Office and Chemists teams faced each other. There were not many enthusiasts present, but their number will doubtless increase as the season advances.

The teams lined up under Referee White as follows:

Abitibi—Little, L.F.; Patterson, r.f.; Anson, c.; W. Orr, r.g.; Rundlette, l.g. Chemists—Kelly, l.f.; Wilkins, r.f.; Odell, c.; Charlton, r.g.; J. Orr, l.g.

FIRST PERIOD. The game started off in fairly sensational manner, the Chemists scoring three baskets in quick succession. The Office team then became more settled and Captain Anson scored from a foul. Following this the Office team pressed closely but their forwards were too well marked to do much damage. Little further advanced the Abitibi score from a foul by Odell on Anson. After this reverse the Chemists pressed and Kelly scored two baskets in succession. Just before time was called the Chemists' guards let up on the Abitibi forwards and Patterson scored their first basket from a long pass by Anson. The first period ended with the score eleven points to four in favor of the Chemists.

SECOND PERIOD. Sefton relieved W. Orr as right guard on the Abitibi Team. The Office team are now shooting into the south basket and the play evened up somewhat. The Abitibi started off with a great rush and almost tied the score with three baskets by Little & Anson. Wilkins then scored on a foul on J. Orr by Patterson. The Abitibi made further additions to their score with baskets scored by Patterson on a quick pass from Little and a long shot from Sefton. Wilkins scored two more for the Chemists, the second period ending with the score of sixteen points each.

THIRD PERIOD. McConomy relieved Patterson at right forward on the Abitibi Team. Both teams were now perceptibly weakening, the pace telling on nearly everyone of the players. The play was consequently of a desultory nature, each team scoring two baskets and a foul. Midway through this period Anson and Odell got into a mix up and Referee White awarded a double foul, neither side however being able to convert same, the third period ending with the score still a tie of twenty-one points.

EXTRA TIME. Both teams agreed to play extra time of five minutes each way. The strain was now telling particularly on the Chemists team and the Abitibi took the lead with baskets scored by Little and Anson. On the change of ends both teams tried hard and the Chemists certainly had bad luck with some of their shots. A basket scored by Kelly concluded the scoring, the game ending in favor of the Abitibi team by twenty seven points to twenty-five.

Scoring—Abitibi. Little 7 baskets, 2 fouls; Anson 2 baskets, 1 foul; Patterson 2 baskets; Sefton 1 basket. Chemists—Kelly 8 baskets, 1 foul; Wilkins 3 baskets, 2 fouls.

A feature of the game was the brilliant play of Fritz Anson, the Captain of the Abitibi team. He and Little starred for the office, while Kelly of the Chemists' was by no means left in the shade.

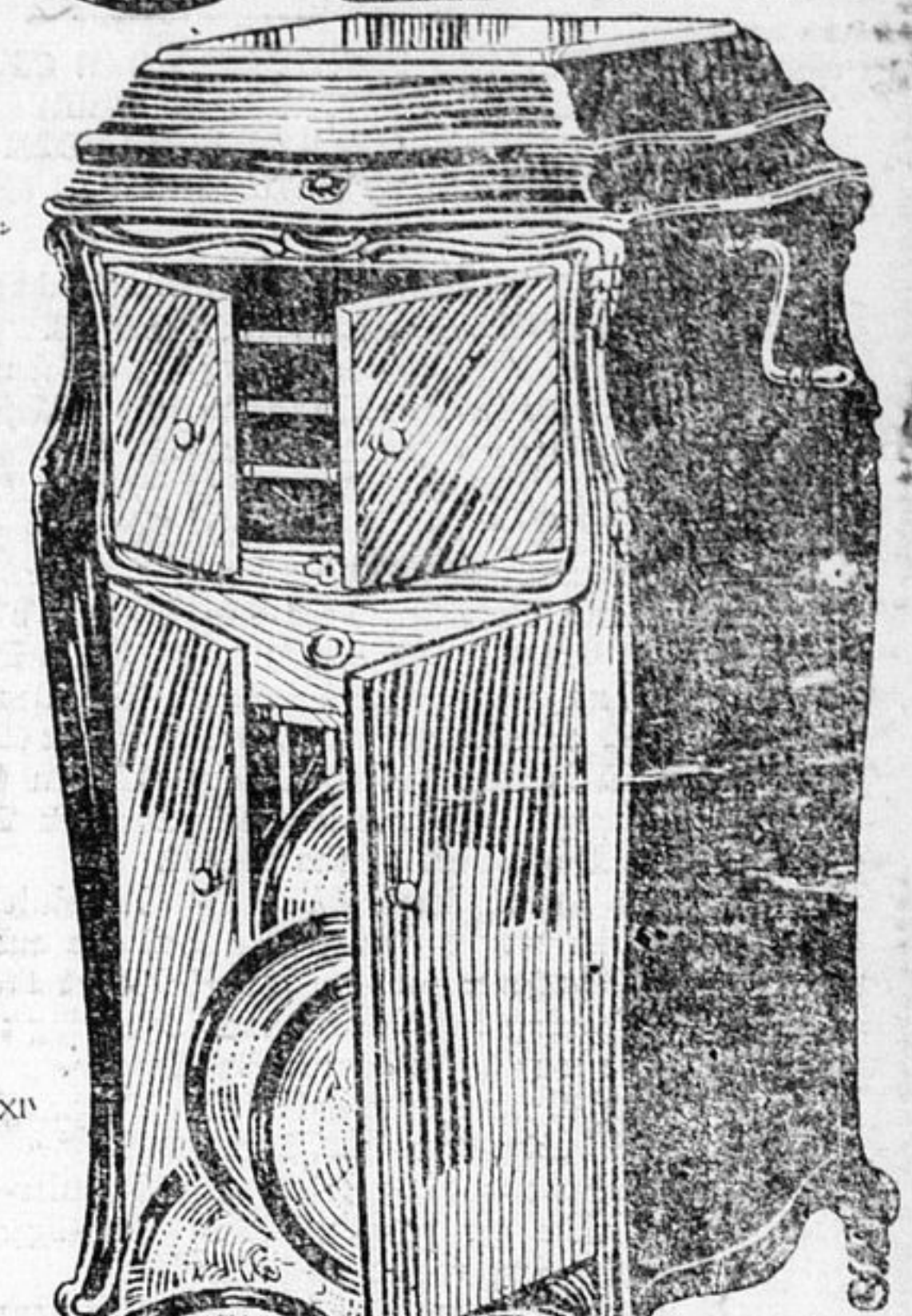
