Timmins News in Brief

Beautiful weather! The thermometer on Monday registered 45 degrees below zero.

R. F. C. Cadet K. F. DeLong came up from Toronto last night for a short furlough at his home here.

Postmaster Peters ejected a dog from the post office one day this week. The lady who owned the dog said: "My dear sir you should not do that," or words to that effect.

A meeting of the congregation of St. Matthew's Church will be held after the service on Sunday evening next for the purpose of choosing another warden.

John Carnovale, who has been in the Camp for a number of years, has transferred his barber business on Third Avenue, as he leaves shortly to take up military duties under the Military Service Act.

The D.Y.B. Club held a very pleasant session at the home of Mrs. Ellis on Monday evening, where they will meet again on Monday night next. The work taken in this week included: 15 pair of sock, 3 shirts.

There will be no hockey game this week, partly owing to the Market Carnival coming on Wednesday evening. There will likely be a meeting of the League this week to re-arrange the schedule as there seems to be some difficulty about one team in the League securing practice or game nights.

On Monday evening a man ran up to Alf Luxton and said "There's a fire down there in one of those houses," pointing down past Mr. Luxton's residence. Mr. Luxton promptly turned in an alarm, and the firemen as promptly responded. No one could find any fire anywhere, however, the man who saw the fire or thought he saw the fire being unable to see it again anywhere.

Mr. J. K. Moore last week received a very interesting photograph of the "Snipers of the First Construction Battalion." These are men from the North Land, and of course they know how to shoot to hit. The photo is a very clear one and gives excellent likenesses of the men. In the group are Jack Nicholson, of Golden City, and Fred Connolly, of South Porcupine.

A block of \$100,000 of the first mortgage 6 per cent., 20-year bonds of the Mattagami Pulp & Paper Co., is being offered the public with a bonus of common stock. The company controls pulpwood lands containing four million cords of spruce, estimated to be sufficient for 50 years of operation. The plant of the company is at Smooth Rock Falls.

Mr. Morley, of Moneta, who has been cutting wood and hauling it to town, met with an unfortunate accident several days ago. He cut his foot with the axe while in the bush. He immediately drove into town to secure surgical attention, but the injury has since proved a serious one and the amputation of his foot may be necessary. He is going to Toronto this week for an operation and treatment.

The cold weather last week played havoc with the waterworks system at Hailybury. The freezing up of pipes in many private houses caused serious inconvenience and some damage. The worst incident, however, was the bursting of the waterfront on the range at the Attorney Hotel. The explosion shattered the stove completely and woke up many of the residents of the town. Some damage was further done by the scattering of fire and water through the explosion. Fortunately no one was near the range at the time, so no one was injured, except by the natural shock to the nerves through hearing so much noise all at once in a quiet town like Hailybury.

One of the most striking and noteworthy of the generous gifts offered to the Government during this time of war is the patriotic proposal of Mr. A. Pierre, of Montreal, brother of Councillor Chas. Pierre, of Timmins. Mr. A. Pierre is the head of the Montreal fur business that is one of the most prosperous concerns of its kind on this continent. The expected turnover of the business this year will run in neighborhood of a million dollars. In addition to his interest in the fur business Mr. A. Pierre owns a monster farm in the West. He has spent a large amount of money on this farm, and it would be considered as easily worth \$125,000. There are 2500 acres of the best land, 75 head of cattle, 35 horses, 2000 bushels of wheat, the most modern barns, houses and other buildings, tractors and all necessary up-to-date equipment of every kind. This has all been offered by Mr. Pierre to the Government, free, for the duration of the war, for the use and benefit of Returned Soldiers.

The South Porcupine I.O.O.F. will attend divine service in the Anglican church at South End on Sunday, Feb. 10th at 7 p.m.

An odd incident or coincidence regarding the work of the Porcupine Exception Tribunal is the fact that on one day alone there were no less than six barbers before the Board applying for exemption.

The first Box Social of the Season is advertised for Friday evening, Feb. 8th, in the Masonic Hall, Timmins. Dancing at 8 p.m., with the best of music, and with three prizes for the best dancers. The event is being organized by some of the young men of the town and an invitation is extended to all to attend.

According to word received here last week Mr. Pete Bardessono has been transferred to the Machine Gun Section and is training for an officer's duties. He will likely remain in Canada for some months in training, but no one who knows him will doubt but that he will make an unusually good officer, as good as he will look, which will be creditable indeed.

Councillors Chas. Pierre returned this week from a visit of a month or more to Winnipeg, Montreal, Toronto and other points. At Winnipeg Councillor Pierre was present at the death and funeral of his father, Mr. Jacob Pierre, one of the esteemed pioneers of the great West. Councillor Pierre stayed in Montreal for a time pending the success of an operation on his daughter who was ill with appendicitis. All will be glad to know that though very seriously ill the patient is now making good progress to recovery at the Royal Victoria Hospital.

All the local hockey teams have their new uniforms now, and this fact should add interest to the games of the Porcupine League. From now on not only will the appearance of the men on the ice be improved but it will be possible for men on the ice and the spectators alike to more easily distinguish between the members of the various teams. The Firemen's uniform is a particularly classy one of white and royal purple with a neat monogram on the breast of the sweater. The Empires have a red, white and blue effect; the Canadiens, black and old gold; and the Crowns, purple and red, with a crown on the breast of the sweater. All have toques and sockings to match.

Over four hundred were present at the hockey match at the Timmins Rink on Wednesday evening when the Firemen and the Porcupine Crown team tried conclusion. The game was a close and lively one from start to finish but especially so after the first period. The Crowns were strong in defence and at goal, while the Firemen put up a lively battle but were the losers to the tune of 5 to 3. For the Firemen in the second period the old-timers, "Scorchy" Lowe and Geo. Lake went on the ice for the first time in a year, and for a rare time in several years. The score at the end of the first period was three to nothing, but in the next two periods the Firemen were able to get three, but not able to stop the Crowns scoring an extra couple.

Ontario newspapers have often boasted that for years past there has never been a newspaper man confined in Kingston penitentiary. The reason appears to be that no one seems smart enough to catch the villains.

The new patent stove pipe manufactured by Patenaude and Berin, and described in a recent issue of The Advance, is proving very popular and attracting much attention all over the country. An order for three carloads of this safety stove pipe has been received from Saskatoon, Sask., and "sure we'll fill the order," say the partners. They started out making 150 lengths a day, but now they are averaging 250 per day. Saturday last they made 255, and with the introduction of a new machine they are designing for cutting out the sheets they expect to make at least 600 per day before long. As the new safety pipe will go with ordinary stove pipe the sales should be general and steady from the start, and it looks as if the Timmins inventors had struck a useful and popular line that will prove one of this town's big industries.
