**GIVEN TWO YEARS
FOR SERIOUS OFFENCE**

Jos. Demarkis Sentenced Last Week. Other Police Court Cases.

The police court is one of the busiest places in town these days—and one of the most interesting from a human nature viewpoint. Last week, for instance, there were a couple of illuminating illustrations of human nature, good and bad. The one was that a man who had used a woman for immoral purposes—formed a plan against her when he could no longer profit through her. The other was that of a woman sentenced to the Reformatory asking to be allowed to give some cigarettes to some other prisoners whose evidence had helped to convict her. "They didn't want to harm me," she said, "and they just told the truth, and I'm sorry because they're now in trouble over other things."

Jos. Demarkis, charged with living on the avails of prostitution, was convicted out of his own mouth and from letters and other evidence produced in court. He was sentenced to two years, less one day.

Provincial Officer Ackroyd picked up N. Sheay at the Junction. Sheay, who is a French-Canadian, was fighting here instead of overseas. Also he had a bottle on him. He had not enough money on him to pay the fine, so went down for three months. N. Gutai and A. Mackie, charged by the Provincial, with being drunk, failed to appear. Their bail was estreated and warrants issued for their arrests. C. Gregorvitch and M. Matrisky for being disorderly and fighting over a lady, were fined \$10 and costs each.

The high-grading cases were remanded for another week.

Constable McInnis charged Todor Moyceff, Bulgarian, with having both booze and dynamite illegally. Todor thought the police must have put both where they were found. The Magistrate thought otherwise, and so Todor went down for three months, lacking the \$200 fine and costs. Constable McInnis also had Steve Siglar fined \$10 and costs for being drunk. Steve had been at a wedding, but he could not have been the best man there, for many of the others carried their liquor much better.

Moses Toafey faced five charges of breach of the O.T.A.—four of selling and one of illegally keeping liquor for sale. He was given a remand on all counts for a week. Tony Salvatore was charged with two different offences of selling liquor and one of keeping it for sale. He did not appear and two warrants for his arrest were issued. Antonio Dillizey was charged by Constable Green with illegally having liquor. He and his partner, Poecuala Selacei, upset a cutter and broke their bottle in the smash. Antonio was fined \$200 and costs, and the partner \$25 and costs for being drunk, while they must also pay for the damage to the rig.

Natt Rooney was fined \$25 and \$10 costs for being drunk. A couple of weeks ago he said his name was "Natty." Now, he'll think that should be his name if he goes on such expensive drunks again.

**MR. DAVE McDUGALL COUNTY
MASTER OF L.O.L.**

At the meeting of the County L.O.L. held at Haileybury on Tuesday Bro. Dave McDougall was elected and installed as Country Master for the ensuing term. Three were nominated for the honor, including the retiring County Master, S. G. McCoubrey. The other two were Bro. J. M. Coghill, of Elk Lake, and Bro. McDougall of the Steam Plant, A. P. & P. Co., Iroquois Falls. The contest seemed to centre between the North and the South of the County and Mr. McCoubrey retired in favor of Mr. McDougall so as not to split the vote. Mr. McDougall was then elected and installed. Bro. J. M. Coghill, of Elk Lake, was elected Deputy County Master for the year.

News of Porcupine Men Now Overseas.

France, Jan. 5th, 1918.

Mr. and Mrs. L. Newton.
Dear Friends:—Just a few lines hoping to find you all O.K., as this leaves me fairly well at present. I received the Christmas stocking and thank you very much for the same. I thought everybody in Timmins had forgotten us, as we seldom get a word from there now, so your letter and parcel came as a very pleasant surprise. Well, Len, the bunch is getting smaller all the time. The last one to leave us was Bert Halcrow. He has gone to England on a staff job and will likely be there for some time. I met Billy White a few days ago. We were on the march, and passing through a French village I saw him but I had only time to say "How do!" That is the first time I have seen him since he left us about twenty months ago. He was invalided to England, but came out again. Well, we are back again among the Canadian troops now, so we will be able to meet some of our old pals I hope, but the weather is so cold that all a fellow thinks about in his spare time is to find a warm spot and stay there. Denny Reid is still here, also Tom Huntley and Jack Morrow, and Smoke. Scotty Gardener is in England, also Chris. Rutherford. I met Andy Dooley sometime ago and he was doing well. Jack Nicholson called to see us one day. He said that Bill Ogilvy was with him in the same Battalion. I heard about Jack Hill being back in Porcupine. It is about eighteen months since I saw him. I think this is all just now.

**SOLDIERS' VOTE 90 PER CENT.
FOR UNION GOVERNMENT.**

According to despatches from Ottawa, although there is no complete return yet, there is enough known to warrant the belief that 90 per cent. of the soldiers' vote in the recent Dominion election was cast for the Union Government. From this it is figured that any Laurier candidate elected by less than 1000 majority of the home vote will be defeated when the overseas votes are added to the count. This will mean that there will be only one or two Laurier candidates elected in Ontario, only about six in the Maritime provinces, and several of the Quebec seats will revert to the Union Government. From present indications also members of the former Conservative party will have a majority over both former Liberals and present Laurierites. Such a standing, of course, would upset the theory that the Union Government is at the mercy of certain Liberals whose former affiliations might prompt them at any time to "spill the beans." As Hon. Mr. Guthrie suggested here, no one can "put anything over" on anybody; the people have given a war mandate to a war government to "carry on," and the soldiers—who are the men most concerned—have made it almost unanimous.

**ALIEN AGITATOR SAID
TO HAVE SPOKEN HERE.**

There was a report last week that an alien agitator had addressed a meeting attended largely by Austrians, Russians and Bulgarians, and in the course of the evening the alien had made occasion to preach a species of anarchism, pacifism and general disloyal deviltry. It was also said that the speaker was a German and that the whole proceedings were distinctly in bad taste, to put it mildly enough to suit some people. On hearing these reports the police commenced investigation, but if it was a German agitator that spoke and if his hearers understood as little of what he said as they now pretend,—well no harm could have been done. However, it is well for all the alien enemies,—Bulgarian, Austrian or whatnot,—to understand that even their presence at such a meeting puts them open to severe penalties. It might also be well for other aliens to remember that if a sense of decency and gratitude to this country will not induce them to frown upon anything even approaching treason or sedition, the law will sooner or later find an unpleasant way of impressing them.
