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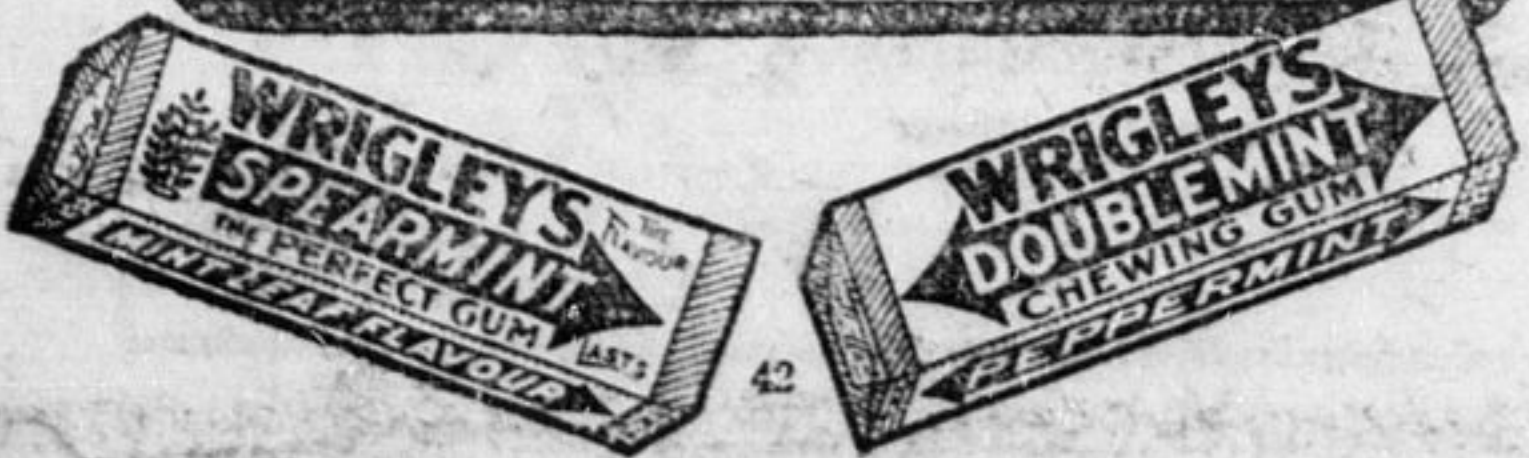


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## TIMMINS RED CROSS DOING GOOD WORK

## THREE LIQUOR CASES BEFORE POLICE COURT

Also Some Theft Charges and Other Matters of Interest.

Thursday's court was a varied one, theft edging booze and disorderly conduct being crowded along by one thing or another. Moses Toafey, on a charge of selling liquor and another charge of keeping it for sale, was fined \$250 on each count,—a total of \$500 and costs paid. The charges were laid by Chief Clark and Constable Greer. Constable McInnis had Joseph Mark ovitch on a charge of selling. The fine was \$200 and costs. While court was on, Inspector Rowell and Constable Greer slipped out and returned after time with Jos. Blomin, whom they charged with selling liquor. He was fined \$250 and costs. The charge of theft preferred by W. R. Lowery a gainst Jacob Freed was remanded for a week as was also the high-grading case. In the latter, however, the Magistrate warned both sides to be ready this week as there had been remands enough. Peter Kluk, the Austrian who had raised the disturbance at the Hollinger several days ago threatening to fix shift bosses and whatnot, was fined \$100 and costs by Magistrate Atkinson for being drunk and disorderly on mine property. The charge of theft preferred against Duff Larocque was dismissed, as the evidence, while showing that he was in possession of the watch owned by a young lady at the Frontenac Hotel, did not show that he had anything to do with the stealing of it. Victoria Lapointe, the young lady brought back from Sudbury at the same time as Larocque, was remanded until this week, bail being renewed. Her explanation of finding the watch in her suitcase, being allowed to wear the ring, intending to return them, etc., did not much impress the Magistrate. Solicitor Cook made a strong appeal for the young lady as the couple intended to get married and live happily ever after. As the young ladies losing the watch and ring concerned have received their jewelry back and as provision will likely be made for paying the costs entailed in the recovery of the goods, it is likely that the Solicitor's plea will not be strongly countered when the case comes up again this week.

### ANNUAL STATEMENT OF ABITIBI POWER & PAPER CO.

The annual statement of the Abitibi Power & Paper Co., as given out at Montreal last week shows that the Company earnings during 1917, before providing for depreciation, etc., were \$1,323,001. After writing off the depreciation, interest, etc., \$341,128 was carried forward to the surplus. A dividend of \$70,000 on preferred stock was paid from this, leaving a net surplus of \$271,123 to carry forward and add to the previous year's surplus of \$360,925. This makes the total surplus now \$632,048. The earnings for 1917 were \$341,123, compared to \$256,164 in 1916. In 1917 an expenditure of \$2,166,897 was made on extensions and improvements by which the daily capacity of the plant is increased to 325 tons of ground wood pulp, 130 tons sulphite pulp and 325 tons of paper. As the plant of the Abitibi Power & Paper Co. is located at Iroquois Falls, these figures are of more than passing interest in the North Land.

At the regular session of the Odd-fellows last night a handsome wrist watch was presented to Bro. Reg. Jones, together with expressions of best wishes and good luck. Bro. Jones leaves on Monday for Toronto to take up Military duties under the M.S.A.
