Mr. Neil J. MacAulay, Mining Recorder, ex-Mayor of Haileybury, and well-known and esteemed all through the North Land, was married on Wednesday evening, February 20th., at Haileybury, to Miss Phoebe Vanessa Devine. Good wishes will be many and sincere in the district.

The regular meeting of the D.Y.B. Club was held Monday evening at the home of Mrs. R. J. Jemmett and a very pleasant evening enjoyed by all present.

Haileybury last week had another odd explosion, this time at the home of Mr. J. D. Carmichael. In the night the water pipes in connection with the kitchen range froze up solid preventing the ready escape of steam, and when the fire was briskened up in the morning there was a smash-up. The explosion resulted in a fire starting and the fire brigade had to be called out. The blaze, however, was soon extinguished. Mrs. Carmichael was injured in the head by a flying piece of metal and is also suffering from shock.

If there are any in Timmins who are in possession of any of the recent "Pastor Russell" literature they would be wise to turn it over at once to the police. The Dominion Government has recently discovered that this pretended "religious" literature is apparently part of a pro-German propaganda, and seizures of the pamphlets and book, and several arrests in connection therewith, have taken place in many places in Canada. Five persons were before Magistrate Pumaville at New Liskeard last week for having this foolish (if not worse) "Pastor Russell Dope" in their possession.

The canvassers for the Victory Loan bonds in Haileybury are generously donating all their commissions to the Children's Aid Society of the district. Mr. Robt. LeHeup, Agent for the Temiskaming branch of the Society, has already received \$500 from this account and it is expected that the total will amount to about \$1000. The gift will be a godsend to the C.A.S. work, while too much praise could hardly be given to the doubly patriotic canvassers for the Victory Loan in Haileybury. Not only did they give efficient and generous service in selling the bonds for the advancement of Canada and the Cause, but they have now added to this the generosity of giving all they earned with so much effort and interest to another truly patriotic cause,—the Children's Aid Society.

These treaties provide for the drafting of the citizens of each country in the army of the country in which they now reside. The United States can draft Canadians and other British subjects now in the States, the age limits being 20 to 45. Great Britain and Canada can draft United States citizens resident under the Union Jack, the age limits being from 21 to 31—the United States draft ages. There are 250,000 Canadians and other British subjects coming under the force of the treaties in the United States, while Canada has 36,000 U. S. citizens who will be affected, and Great Britain has 24,000 more.
