BLIND PIGS HAVING THEIR EYES OPENED

Special Provincial Men Have Number of Cases in Timmins.

For some weeks past two men hired by the Province have been investigating the places where liquor was illegally handled in Timmins, and the result was partly shown in Thursday's police court. Dan Legacy was fined \$300 and costs; Charette Bros., \$200 and costs each; Mick Mortgage, \$200 and costs; M. Hurtibise, \$50 and costs and a Polack living near the Skating Rink was fined \$500 and costs. The Case against Hurtibise was out of the ordinary, as he was fined for "consuming liquor" in a public place. According to the evidence he had simply taken a drink when a round was bought by another man—one of the special Provincial men. The charge against Hurtibise was reduced from the more serious one of having liquor illegally in a public place. The chief evidence in all these Provincial cases was given by the special men. Charette Bros. pleaded guilty. In each case there were other charges that were not pressed. Legacy escaped from custody early Friday morning.

The case of illegally selling liquor preferred against Rachel Popovite who lives with one of the men convicted, was withdrawn. A warrant was issued for the arrest of Joe Blouin on a liquor charge. At present he seems to be away.

Constable Rayeroff had John Pernar charged with beating his wife Pernar had given her a bad pair of black eyes. Magistrate Atkinson gave Pernar six months in jail.

Jacob Freed failed to answer to his name when called upon to answer to the charge of theft preferred by W. R. Lowery. If he does not answer before the June assizes his bail of \$1000 will be forfeited.

A. Biscornet, charged with selling gold ore, pleaded guilty and asked for leniency. Magistrate Atkinson reserved sentence until this week.

Constable Greer had Tom Koslo and John Skelvitch before the Magistrate for being drunk and disorderly. The fine was \$10 and costs each. Constable Greer also had a charge of illegally selling liquor against Joe Durkeski. Magistrate Atkinson fined Durkeski \$300 and costs.

Chief Clark had Constant Gregors in custody for failing to report as an alien enemy. He claimed to be a Roumanian, and Magistrate Atkinson remanded him for a week to secure proof. He was allowed out on \$100 bail.

Constable McInnis had Sam Popindusky and Alex. Evandusky before the court under the "clubbing" section of the O.T.A. Evandusky was fined \$200 and costs.

The case against Sam Grusha was enlarged for a week. Grusha was charged by G. Capra with obtaining goods fraudulently by falsifying accounts. After his first hearing Grusha managed to walk out of jail, but he was picked up on the train by Officer R. Allen and returned.

Constable Rayeroff had Roman Koziazk fined \$10 and costs for being intoxicated in a public place.

O. St. Pierre and John St. Pierre were turned over to the Military authorities by Magistrate Atkinson. The first named had been given opportunity previously to secure his birth certificate to show that he was under age as he claimed. Both young men expressed their willingness now to go into the Army.

Sam Saschuck, who obtained \$200 for cheques that proved worthless was given six months in jail to think nobler ways of getting money.

Nelson Perron, on a charge of having in his possession stolen goods was given another week's remand on bail.

The lads charged with stealing "a shrub or underbrush" were remanded for another week.

Mamie Russell charged with keeping a disorderly house pleaded not guilty. The only evidence to sustain the charge was that of Joe Paris who claimed he had been taken there by a man whom he called "Joe the Polack" and whom he identified as Joe Gilbert. As Paris, however, was intoxicated at the time of his alleged visit and as he could not find the place the next day for the police his evidence was not conclusive. While in the place, he claimed that he lost \$170 in cash, but he could not definitely accuse either the woman or Gilbert of taking the money. After the case against this woman was dismissed, charges of stealing the money referred to were withdrawn against the woman and against Gilbert. A charge of drunkenness against Paris was also withdrawn. "That drunk apparently cost him enough already," said the Magistrate. Indeed a number of cases arising out of the loss of the money were withdrawn while the Magistrate gave all concerned some good advice.

ANOTHER PRISONER ESCAPES FROM TIMMINS JAIL.

Early Friday morning the man named Legacy, convicted on Thursday of a breach of the Ontario Temperance Act, made his escape from the Timmins jail. Apparently, he followed the way of Archie Houle who escaped a couple of weeks ago. Legacy had been fined \$300 and costs but this was later reduced to \$300 and an effort was being made to raise the money to pay the fine. Legacy apparently escaped through the window over the door at the side of the cell room, the bars of this window having been bent by the previous man escaping. Thursday night there were a great many in the jail, and to give some measure of comfort to those in the cells, some were left in the locked room outside the bars. Legacy was one of those so left. Now, the police are locking up everybody in the cells at night. Chief Clark says he has an unusual record in the matter of escaped prisoners, no less than one a month getting away since he came on the job here. He thinks this is quite enough now, and that hereafter there will be no more.

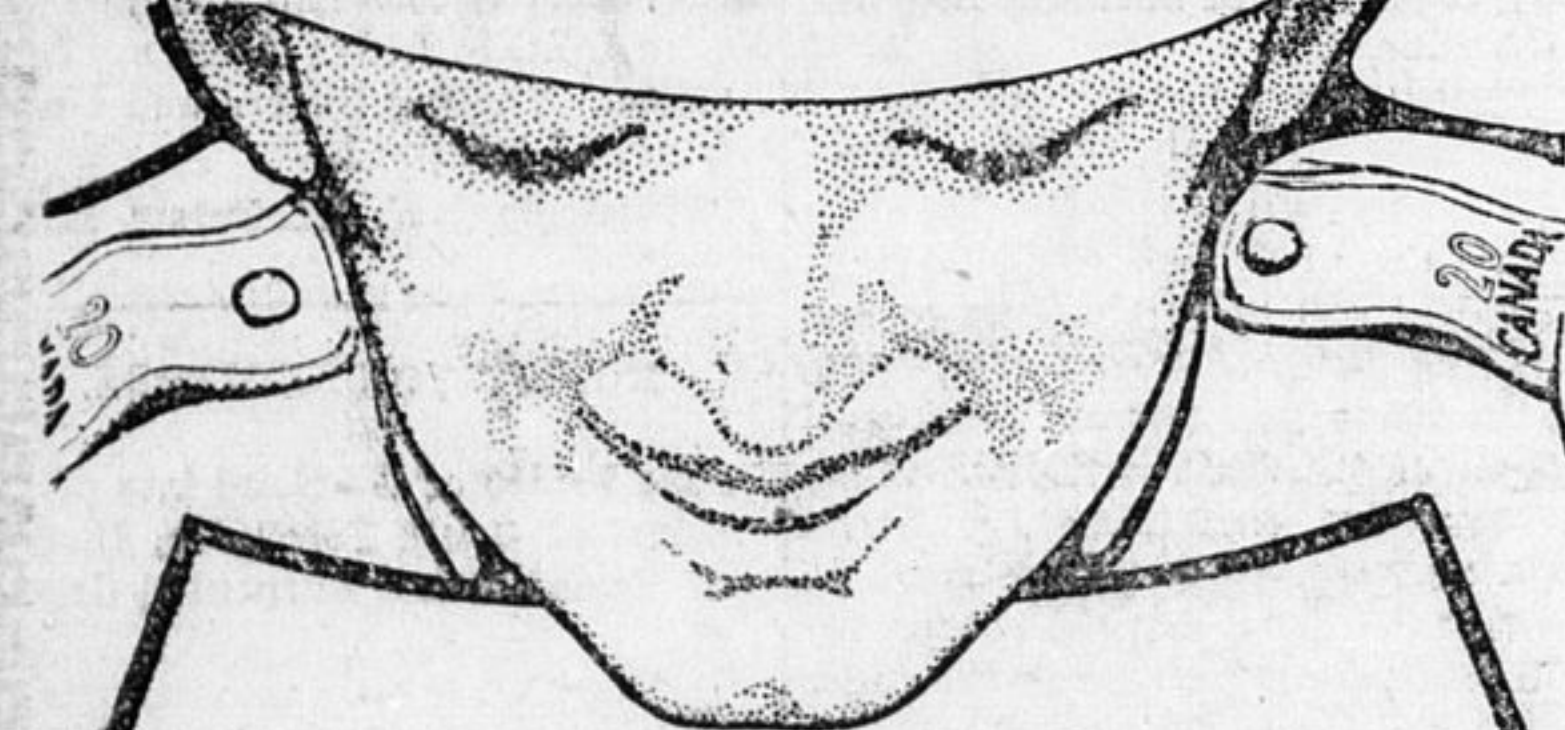
