Mr. Dave Quinn of South Porcupine left last week for Edmonton to take up farming.

Mrs. S. Kitchen left Schumacher last Friday on the National for a visit to Huntville. She was accompanied by Master Arnold Hawkins.

Rev. J. Macdonald was a visitor to Haileybury last week in connection with the meeting of the Temiskaming Presbytery.

Mrs. Breen, and children who have been staying in town for a couple of months, returned to Toronto last Friday on the National.

Mr. Gilbert Eldridge, who has been in charge of the Northern Canada Supply Co. Store at Haileybury, has returned to Timmins.

This week the bars on all the windows of the town jail were made safe and secure against burglars. Hereafter no more thieves will be able to break through and steal—either in or out again.

Provincial Game Inspector Parks and Game Warden Coffey were in town last week in connection with the furs seized at Mr. Chas. Pierce's warehouse. The otter skin seized was returned to Mr. Pierce, while the "rat" skins were confiscated and a fine of \$150 imposed.

Mr. L. Lebarre, Game Warden for this district, recently shot a wolf that measures over six feet in length. There is a bounty for the killing of wolves, but in view of some of the offers for the wolf hide Mr. Lebarre may not trouble with the bounty. To secure the bounty the hide must be forwarded to the Department in Toronto, while the amount securable for the wolf hide as a curiosity and on account of its large size would offset the bounty in this case.

An alarm of fire was sounded shortly after nine o'clock on Monday night, and the fire brigade made a quick run down to 67 Maple street. The trouble, however, was only an overheated chimney, and there was no real fire to fight. In a few minutes everything was all right and safe. "Just another false alarm," says Fireman Dan in a half-disappointed sort of tone, "we never have any fires here anyway!" "That's right enough," says Charlie, "but touch wood quick just the same!" The wind was blowing strong—the kind of a night that a fire would be difficult to hold. There was a big crowd gathered quickly at the sound of the alarm, many coming from the auction sale then in progress.

The late Alex. Kelso, who died some days ago at the Iroquois Falls hospital, is said to have amassed much wealth in the North Land. Usually dressed as a farmer at work, or a woodsman, he did not give the impression of a wealthy man, but his carriage, his courtesy and his cultured manner bespoke the Highland gentleman. He was born in Inverness, Province of Quebec, in 1857, of Highland Scotch parentage, and it was one of his pleasures to meet men who also could "talk the two talks." The name "Alexo," given to the nickel mine at Kelso was coined from the first part of his Christian name and the last letter of his surname.

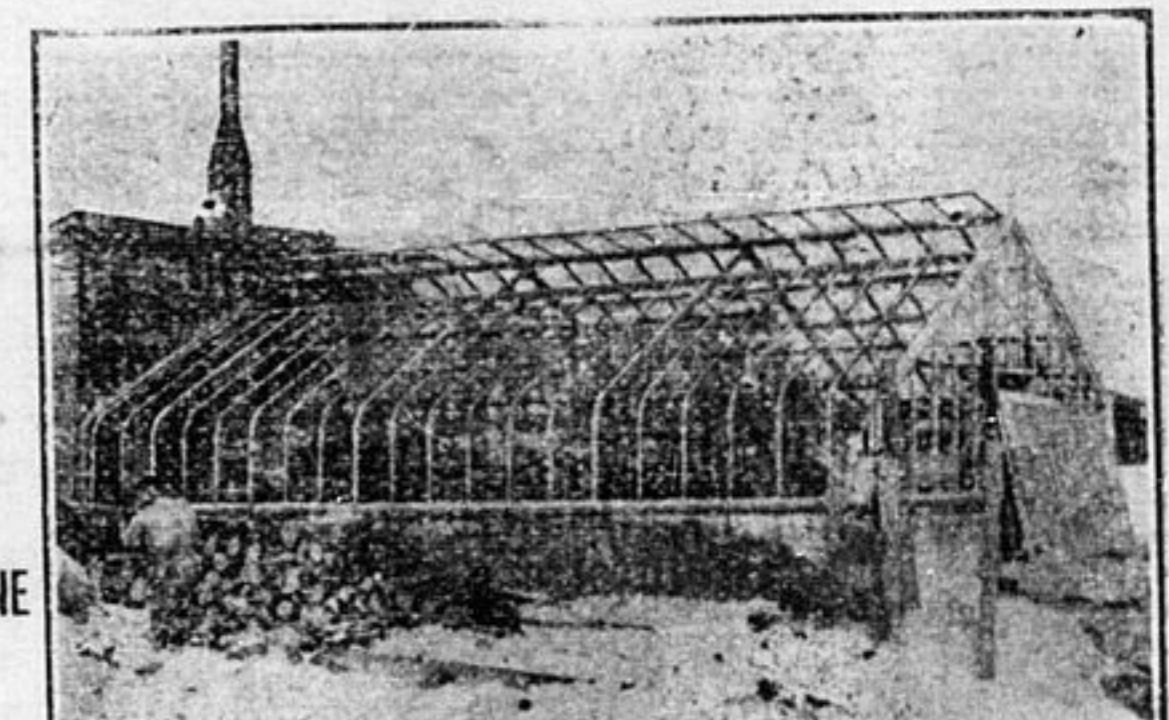
