Large Amount of Work Done in Last Two Months.

BERNARD McENANBY LEFT ESTATE OF OVER \$48,000.

According to the inventory recently filed in the Surrogate Court, the late B. J. McEnaney, who died last month in Toronto, left an estate valued at \$48,511. He left no will. His widow who resides in Toronto, will get one-third of the estate, and the other two-thirds will be divided among his four sons and five daughters. The inventory gives the amount of real estate held by the deceased as \$34,000, while the stocks held have a present market value of \$23,313. The stocks include 279,400 shares in the Maidens Silver Mining Co., given in the inventory as of no value, and 179,333 shares in the Porcupine Crown, quoted at 13 cents per share. The inventory also includes a list of "interests in patent parcels" in Whitney, South Lorraine and La-belle Township, valued at \$1500.
